This is another auspicious occasion when the University celebrates academic success of young scholars and professionals. I also note with appreciation the contribution of parents and guardians in making this accomplishment possible.

The University has also established strong partnerships with Nanjing University in China and Virginia Tech University in the USA. These engagements will benefit the University in terms of infrastructural development, capacity building of students and staff, retooling workshops, exchange programmes, joint supervision, equipping labs, joint teaching of short courses and others.

Let me conclude with a word of advice to our graduands. As we formally release you from the University, know that the world out there is full of challenges. But together with the challenges, which themselves are surmountable, there are countless opportunities. You have all that it takes to overcome the challenges and to make the best of the opportunities. This is what we expect you to do. Do it with courage and determination. he Directorate of Marketing and Resource Mobilisation (DMRM) has undertaken a number of initiatives in line with its mandate in the last half year. The most important ones are outlined below:

#### Graduate Recruitment Programme

Egerton University in collaboration with Transsion Holdings - a company best-known in emerging markets for its leading mobile brands, including TECNO, Itel and Infinix - held a Graduate Recruitment Exercise on 18 and 19 October 2017 at Njoro Campus. The exercise, a first of its kind at the University, had selected for participation students from the Faculties of Commerce, Engineering & Technology, and Science. Speaking on behalf of the company, Mr. Dickson Ireri, Training Head and Retail Manager, TECNO, said that they were looking for potential employees who are passionate, confident, self-driven and with a vision. The students were given a career talk by representatives of the company and also took an aptitude test followed by a face-to-face interview. Mr. Ireri announced that several students will be picked to join TECNO and its affiliates.

#### **Project Vehicle**

Egerton University received a project vehicle from the International Crops Research Institute for the Semi-Arid Tropics (ICRISAT). The ceremony took place on 13 September 2017 at Njoro Campus. This donation highlighted the importance of the working partnership that Egerton University has with ICRISAT, an international non-profit organisation that undertakes scientific research for development.

# Memorandum of Understanding with Michigan State University

On 11 September 2017, Egerton University signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Michigan State University (MSU), USA. Speaking during the occasion, held at Egerton University's Njoro Campus, Prof. Thomas Jayne from MSU said that the partnership seeks to build capacity at Masters and Ph.D. levels in the Agricultural sector as well as to add understanding on the pressing policy issues facing Kenya.

"We are hoping that there will be a strong team of researchers and students who will be working together to mutually build the capacity of our institutions as well as to produce good Masters and Ph.D.level graduates through our support to them," said the MSU Foundation Professor of Agricultural, Food, and Resource Economics. Prof. Jayne noted that, under the initial partnership, which will cover five years, the two institutions will develop proposals that will allow partnerships to go on for decades.

Present during the signing of the MoU was Egerton University's Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Rose A. Mwonya, who noted that the University has established strong partnerships with Nanjing University in China and Virginia Tech University in the USA. "The need for active collaboration came out quite strongly during these engagements and Egerton University looks forward to benefiting from these partnerships. Highlights for these engagements include infrastructural development, capacity building of students and staff, retooling workshops, exchange programmes, joint supervision, equipping labs, and joint teaching of short courses", said Prof. Mwonya.

he Directorate of Quality Assurance (DQA) congratulates all the graduands for their academic achievements, which have led to this special day. DQA envisions to be a centre of excellence in the creation of a culture of continuous quality improvement in the University. Here are a few highlights of this year.

# Competency-Based Curriculum Development

DQA, in the 2016/2017 work plan, committed itself to train Deans and Directors on Competency-Based Education and Curriculum/Course Design. This activity was held at Tumaini Conference Centre from 5 to 7 September 2017 under the DVC (AA) in liaison with DQA. This first training session was hosted in conjunction with the Centre of Excellence for Livestock Innovation and Business (CoELIB) and its International partner - the Netherlands Initiative for Capacity Development in Higher Education (NICHE). The second training session was held from 7 to 9 November 2017. The training aimed to enable participants to:

- Explain the purpose of competency-based education and its main features;
- Indicate the required core

competences for graduates from department/faculty and describe performance indicators for each stage or year of the education programme for at least two competences;

- Define learning objectives that include knowledge, skills and attitude;
- Draft competency-based assignments that correspond with the leavers' profile.

# Teaching Effectiveness Evaluation Goes Digital

DQA routinely conducts Teaching Effectiveness Evaluation (TEE) and Practical Instruction Effectiveness Evaluation (PIEE) in line with the Commission for University Education (CUE), Universities Standards and Guidelines (2014), and PROG/STD/15 that require every Lecturer/ Technologist to be evaluated at least once in an academic year.

This involves procurement of hundreds of reams of photocopying papers and envelopes used to dispatch to the respective lecturers/technologists. It therefore means incurring expenses in procuring papers, envelopes and photocopying services, as well as manhours in manually counting the forms according to the number of students in class before putting them in envelopes and then delivering to the respective departments.

The DVC (AA)'s office, in conjunction with DQA, will in January 2018 launch the new Teaching Effectiveness Management System (TIEMS) whereby the evaluation will be done online saving time. TIEMS will be piloted in the second semester of the 2017/2018 academic year.

#### Establishing Integrated Quality Management Systems (EIQMS) Project

EIQMS is a DIES-partnership between the Centre for Higher Education

Development and Quality Enhancement (CHEDQE) of the University of Duisburg-Essen, DQA, and St. Augustine University in Tanzania. Under the premise "Towards a Culture of Quality", the project aims at establishing structures for integrated quality management systems at the partner universities. The project is funded by the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) under the umbrella of the Dialogue on Innovative Higher Education Strategies (DIES) jointly coordinated by the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) and the German Rectors' Conference (HRK). The project duration is 2014-2017.

The project partners were trained in the field of Higher Education Quality Assurance and jointly developed the respective processes and documents. The project special emphasis was placed on the introduction of evaluation processes at the faculty level at Egerton University and St. Augustine University as well as the conceptualisation and implementation of graduate surveys.

Now in the final phase of the project Egerton University can look back at one very successful faculty evaluation (done by Faculty of Education and Community Studies) and a Graduate Tracer Survey for 2008 graduates from both Faculties of Education and Community Studies, and Agriculture. The implementation of these quality assurance tools was perceived to be very informative for quality assurance processes in the universities. This may help in working out generalisable project outcomes that can give impulses for the further development of Quality Assurance structures and processes in the University, thus ensuring sustainability of the project activities.

In addition, the Faculty secured and was competitively awarded 15 Masters and 10 Doctorate scholarships to deserving staff in Kenyan public universities and other tertiary institutions including public sector employees in agricultural and livestock biosciences and agroprocessing technology.

FOA has been keen to forge publicprivate partnerships that focus on the creation of specialty guided centres of excellence in agriculture, agrotourism, and farmer-and industrycentred student attachments/ internships and job placements. In its pursuit of competitive advantage in the job market, the Faculty recently organised and hosted a career day for finalist (diploma and degree) students that provided a face-to-face engagement with two potential employers, Yara East Africa and UAP Insurance. This event was a great success with a number of today's graduands securing internships and job placements. With recent adoption of holistic and hands-on curricula in all academic programmes, the graduands have received sufficient practical exposure that has developed their technical and non-technical competencies in their respective specialties. #### CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE IN SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE AND AGRIBUSINESS MANAGEMENT

number of activities have taken place recently at the -Centre of Excellence in Sustainable Agriculture and Agribusiness Management (CESAAM). The Centre has made significant strides that will go a long way to help it meet its purpose, which is to ensure sustainability in agriculture and agribusiness management. The core in CESAAM's overall objective is to build capacity in agricultural value chains of African countries, including those that are fragile and post-conflict. The Centre also has a keen interest in promoting gender balance in agriculture, where the target is to have at least 40% female fellows at the Centre. During the launch of the Africa Centre of Excellence (ACE-II) in Nairobi, CESAAM students and the University Management made significant presentations, and our students made an important part of the youth panel during the 4<sup>th</sup> Partner for Skills in Applied Science, Engineering & Technology (PASET) Forum.

The Centre has received its first batch of funding from the World Bank and proper procurement and accounting procedures are in place to help meet the laid down conditions for further engagement. The Centre has signed four important MOUs, with Virginia Tech, CALS, USA; Michigan State University, USA; Louisiana State University, USA; and Nanjing Agricultural University, China. A total of 923 applicants expressed interest in this fellowship and a transparent process ensued. Seventy fellows were successful (27 Ph.D. and 43 M.Sc.). Of the selected applicants (overall representation), 43% of both M.Sc. and P.hD. were female and 36% of the total applicants were from the region. Modern and well-equipped accommodation facilities are available for the students.

Apart from the four MoUs mentioned above, the Centre has plans to sign MoUs with regional academic partners (Sokoine University of Agriculture, Gulu

University, University of Rwanda, University of Burundi, and University of Juba) and local private and public institutions. The need for active collaboration came out strongly during our Inception Workshop, and Egerton University staff and students look forward to benefiting from these partnerships. Highlights of these engagements include infrastructural development, capacity building of students and staff, retooling workshops, exchange programmes, joint supervision, equipping labs, and joint teaching of short courses. Among other activities, the Centre has attended important ACE-II regional meetings, participated in university activities such as World Environment Day, hosted the National Steering Committee (NSC) for Kenyan ACEs, developed a new programme-M.Sc. in Agri-enterprise Development and run a number of public lectures.

The Centre's Leader, Prof. George Owuor, its core-team and administrative assistants have all

### Message from the Dean

he Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences (FASS) has contributed considerably to the number of students who are graduating in today's ceremony. I would like to take this opportunity to express my heartfelt congratulation to you all for the good work and effort you have put into your studies in your respective areas. You are opening a new chapter in your life where you will encounter opportunities and challenges that will test you in innumerable, sometimes unexpected ways. However, with the skills and competencies with which we have equipped you through the Faculty I have no doubt in my mind that you will be able to deal with them appropriately. I would also like to take this opportunity to congratulate the members of staff for the good work that they put into ensuring that your academic progress was smooth and productive.

In July this year, the Faculty organised a debate for the aspirants for the governorship of Nakuru County. There were four candidates who participated in the debate: Mr. Lee Kinyanjui, Dr. Peter Koros, Mr. John Mututho and Mr. John Njoroge. Themed "Kivumbi 2017" and moderated by Mr. Noah Otieno of Kenya Television Network (KTN News), the event was broadcast live on the same station. The Faculty sought to create a channel whereby the key players in the County could interrogate the leaders within a context that was appropriate for intellectual examination of their policies and manifestos.

The Faculty intends to play an increasing role in the political life of the nation through civic education and community development.

The Faculty intends to play an increasing role in the political life of the nation through civic education and community development. In this regard, the Faculty has developed a certificate course in electoral and election management, whose overall aim is to train personnel who are involved in the electoral process, including aspirants for political positions, electoral officials, women aspirants, clerks, etc. We hope to have a meaningful engagement with the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission (IEBC), to whom we have availed a copy of the course curriculum.

The Faculty, through the Department of Philosophy, History and Religious Studies (PHR), has introduced a new Common Core Course designed to equip students with knowledge on national development and integration. The course will empower students with civic knowledge and responsibilities that will enable them to deal with pertinent issues wherever they will find themselves following their graduation from Egerton. The course is titled HIST 100: National Cohesion and Integration in Kenva and it is scheduled to be launched in January 2018.

In addition, Dr. Halkano Wario of the Department of PHR won a grant of Euros 186,200.00 (Ksh21 million) from the Volkswagen Foundation in Germany to support his work on countering violent extremism. It is a three-year humanities post-doctoral fellowship under the initiative "Knowledge for Tomorrow/ Cooperative Research Project in Sub-Saharan Africa". The project is expected to produce an empirical book on the subject, appropriate public policy briefs for state and non-state actors in the area, and engagement with local communities affected by violent extremism in order to find interventions to address the problems. The project will showcase, through exhibition in local and international forums, the resultant materiality of counterradicalisation programmes in Kenya.

### MaMaSe Sustainable Water Initiative Enables Improvement of Water Security

he Mau Mara Serengeti (MaMaSe) Sustainable Water Initiative is a multidisciplinary project focusing on improvement of water security for structural poverty reduction, economic growth and ecosystem sustainability. The project was funded by The Netherlands Embassy and implemented by stakeholders from public, private and civil society organisations in the period 2014–2017. The project site was located in the Mara Basin in Kenya and the activities were structured into thematic areas covering:

• Institutional strengthening of a water resources authority for effective regulation and protection

of water resources to improve the data and ensure equitable water use;

- Protection and conservation of forest and rangeland ecosystems to promote ecosystem friendly livelihoods and improve returns on investments;
- Establishing financing mechanisms with private sector involvement to sustain and upscale the best practices emerging from the project activities;
- Creating a knowledge centre to consolidate the results generated by the project and develop knowledge in the form of data information and tools for wider application in the region.
- All the activities were integrated and,

together, they resulted in the improvement of water security through improvement of water availability, water resources data and information, and adaptation of various practices to limited water conditions. The lessons and best practices from the results were consolidated and used in the creation of the knowledge centre, which was undertaken by the Egerton University component.

The Centre for Integrated Water and Basin Management (CIWAB) has the vision of creating knowledge for improved water security and ecosystem sustainability. Apart from the consolidation of lessons and best

practices, the knowledge creation at the Centre will be enriched by near real time environmental and earth observation data and their derivatives that can now be transmitted to the physical platform through a geonetcast receiver system installed at the Department of Agricultural Engineering

Further results realised during implementation of the MaMaSe project include development and implementation of the short courses aimed at improving the capacity of practitioners, policy makers and beneficiaries in the water and other natural resources related sub-sectors.

To strategically contribute to basin management and development, CIWAB will be guided by the following strategic objectives:

- Knowledge creation through applied research with emphasis on integrated initiatives;
- Enhancing knowledge through creation, and exchange of tools and publications;
- Building capacity through short courses and outreach programmes;
- Mainstreaming cross-cutting issues

and best practices.

It is envisaged that through improved basin management, CIWAB will enable realisation of water security. All players are encouraged to participate and make positive contribution. The team involved in establishing the Centre wishes to thank The Netherlands Embassy, Egerton University and MaMaSe partners for support in realising this noble cause.

Egerton University, through FERD, is seeking for partnerships with the industry and stakeholders in the search for sustainable solutions to the waste management problems facing our country. We have the capacity to provide training to all levels of government, especially county governments.

up to the true word of being stewards of the environment and to remember, at all times, that we have borrowed the goods and services that we enjoy during our lifetime from our great grandchildren and, hence, we are indebted to them. #### FERD FOCUSES ON RESEARCH AND SCHOLARSHIP

Fire has been used as a tool for improving forage quality and productivity for wild and domestic herbivores for millennia, but there has been little knowledge on its role in shaping the interaction between these herbivore guilds. Wilfred O. Odadi and colleagues recently carried out a meticulously designed basic research to address this question. Their findings were published in an article entitled "Fire Induced Negative Nutritional Outcomes for Cattle when Sharing Habitat with Native Ungulates in an African Savanna", which was published in the *Journal of Applied Ecology* (2017). In this paper,

Odadi *et al.* provide strong evidence that prescribed burning has little nutritional benefits for cattle in areas that are also open to wild herbivores. Because wild grazers are also attracted to the nutrient-rich forage on burned areas, it is the un-burned (rather than burned) patches in the landscape mosaic that end up being important areas for grazing cattle when they share foraging areas with wild herbivores, especially during dry periods. These findings have serious management implications. The article by Odadi *et al.* was selected as the best in the issue in which it was published.

#### DEPARTMENT OF GEOGRAPHY IS ON THE ACADEMIC MAP

The Department of Geography is happy to announce the release of *Rural Development Planning in Africa*, edited by Dr. Meleckidzedeck Khayesi, and published by Palgrave Macmillan, New York. The book provides a synthesis of research evidence on selected themes in African rural development planning experience. Each of the nine chapters synthesises theories, methods and empirical evidence on a selected topic that is central to African rural development planning. Two of the chapters were written by scholars from Egerton

University. One is on financing rural development programmes, whose lead author is Mr Rodney Asilla, a Masters student in the Department of Curriculum, Instruction and Education Management. The other chapter, on small market and urban centres, is by Professor Francis N. Wegulo from the Department of Geography. Palgrave Macmillan has approached the Department of Geography to host the writing of a followup book on *Urban Development Planning in Africa*. We expect to have the book off the press by the end of 2019.

n behalf of the staff of the Faculty of Science, I wish to take this opportunity to congratulate all graduands of the 37<sup>th</sup> Graduation Ceremony for their welldeserved achievement. More specifically I salute the Faculty's graduands for enduring the long journey driven by the desire to make an intellectual or practical contribution to the world. I hope your years of hard work have transformed you into a determined and ambitious scientist that our society requires today.

I wish to also take this opportunity to thank the Faculty for their dedication in delivering our institutional core mandate of teaching, research and extension.

This year the Faculty received 568 first years who have joined various programmes in Science, Biomedical Science and Technology, Computer Science, Applied Aquatic Science, Biochemistry, Statistics, and Actuarial Science. I take this opportunity to wish them a productive scholarship and transformation during the four-year journey.

This year the 6<sup>th</sup> cohort of 15 Joint

Degree Masters course in Limnology and Wetland Ecosystems arrived in Kenya from Austria for the Kenyan trimester in early 2017. The participants, from Kenya, Uganda, Zimbabwe, Austria, Guatemala and Rwanda, completed the trimester and are now doing their research. Currently the Faculty has two Ph.D. students from Uganda and two undergraduate students from Kingston University, UK, on a shortterm research and exchange visit. We have also continued to develop our capacity through training. Twenty members of staff are currently at various stages of their training in Kenya, the USA, China, South Africa and Germany.

Our staff and students have continued to excel in competitive research grants. The staff and students from the Departments of Chemistry, Biochemistry, Physics, Biological Sciences, and Computer Science successfully applied for the National Research Fund (NRF) research grants. Eight postgraduate students from the Faculty successfully competed for NRF grants for the 2016 call. Female applicants are asserting their presence in the Chemistry Department which was earlier dominated by male applicants. The funding awards will improve research and teaching facilities in the Department. Four members of staff – Dr. Meshack Obonyo, Dr. Indieka S. Abwao, Prof. Josphat Matasyoh and Prof. Julius Kipkemboi – have NRF proposals short-listed for the second phase of screening. Apart from the annual Egerton University International Research Week, our staff participated in various regional and international conferences and workshops.

Our staff have also continued to connect with peers internationally. A number of scholars have participated in exchange programmes outside the

country. Dr. Bartholomew Ondigo was at the University of Georgia early this year for training in advanced immunology, while Dr. Joshua Kapere has been in Anderson Cancer Centre in the USA, and Ms. Mercy Nasimiyu took part in the African Doctoral Summer Academy in Stellenbosch University, South Africa. Prof. Kennedy Wekesa, a Dean and Professor of Biology at the College of Science, Engineering and Mathematics, Alabama State University, USA, visited the Faculty to discuss collaborations and student opportunities.

Dr. Philip K. Bett from the Department of Biological Sciences participated in an international course on Food Security and Grain Storage Technologies and Management organised and sponsored by Israel's Agency for International Development Cooperation (MAHAV), the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, in conjunction with the Centre for International Agriculture & Development Cooperation (CINADCO), and the Agricultural Research Organisation (ARO), Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development.

In collaboration with the African Virtual University (AVU), the Department of Computer Science has established an Open Distance and eLearning (ODeL) Centre which will act as a physical hub for the creation, organisation and sharing of knowledge and the development of local, distance and eLearning programmes in Applied Computer Science.

Following this collaboration, AVU awarded 20 scholarships to needy female students to undertake a sixweek certificate course in Network Administration. The first cohort

e celebrate the achievement of the graduating students in the Faculty of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery on this 37<sup>th</sup> Graduation Ceremony. It must be a very proud moment for you. Chasing a dream requires your efforts and passion. The hard work is not over when you graduate. It is just a break as you enter the new battlefields of life. Today, I am extremely happy to report how the Faculty has expanded its undergraduate student enrolment base from 62 in 2012, to the current 432. The Staff /Student ratios have also improved to 10:1 in 2017. During the year, two new academic units were created based on areas of specialty, raising the total number to four departments in the Faculty. The four departments are: Veterinary Anatomy & Physiology; Veterinary Pathology, Microbiology & Parasitology; Veterinary Public Health and Pharmacology & Toxicology; and Veterinary Surgery, Theriogenology & Medicine. In the same period, two new M.Sc. and one Ph.D. programme were developed, and are awaiting Senate approval. Members of staff in the Faculty received funding for one project totalling Kshs20 Million under the auspices of the National Research Fund 2017. In addition to this, the Faculty's "Safe Foods Project Proposal" is in the final phases of evaluation to equip its laboratories under the same fund.

In May 2017, a Memorandum of Understanding was signed to foster closer collaboration between the Faculty and Bukura Agricultural College. The Faculty celebrates its recognition by the East and Central African Veterinary Faculties platform which culminated in its admission to the Regional Universities Forum, "RUFORUM", in October 2017. The Faculty is pleased to report the steady progress made by its pioneer batch of 19 students on the Bachelor of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery, who are now in their third year of study.

Once again may I congratulate you on your hard work and accomplishment in the Faculty of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery. I sincerely wish you well in the next phase of your life. May God bless you in your future endeavours!

As BPGS we continue to support and serve our post-graduate students with diligence to make their studies comfortable and at the same time adhere to the University Statutes and Commission for University Education (CUE) regulations. I am aware that we still have issues to sort out, but a step in the right direction is the beginning of the drift. The Directorate is currently embarking on revisions of several procedures in line with the CUE standards to improve delivery of services to our students. Some of these changes include admission procedures, orientation planning, regular progress reports and use of information communication technology.

Some of the major achievements for BPGS are: training of the staff on use of Academic Records Management Software (ARMS) so as to enable the Directorate to shift from manual to digital management of post-graduate students, particularly in admission and registration on the portal. Consequently, most of the postgraduate students have been registered in the ARMS portal and can manage their activities in the comfort of their study rooms across the globe. BPGS organised student orientation forums for new and continuing students in all the Campuses, which included awareness talks by different University departments. For example, in September this year, more than 100 students participated in events held at the Njoro Main Campus. The Directorate has also been engaged in marketing the University post-graduate programmes during the Agricultural Shows (Nakuru and Nairobi) and during the 2017 World Environment Day.

In the 2017–2018 Academic Year. Egerton University received several fellowships for post-graduates which were very competitive. These came from the MasterCard Foundation, RUFORUM, the World Bank (through the CESAAM project), the African Development Bank, the Austrian Development Cooperation (ADC) and NUFFIC (The Netherlands Government). The fellowships increased the number of post-graduate and particularly international students admitted. We have more than 85 Ph.D. and 200 Masters students from more than 10 countries in Africa, Asia and Europe. In September 2017, the Directorate conducted a workshop on curriculum development. Following this, new market-driven post-graduate programmes are being developed, and existing ones are being reviewed in line with CUE requirements. Since post-graduate students constitute an important part of the epitome of the society and are supposed to be societal solution providers, our hope is that the revised curriculum will further provide relevant knowledge for innovative solutions.

raduation is here again, and we celebrate the achievements of the graduating students on this 37<sup>th</sup> Graduation Ceremony. Graduation is an important milestone in academic life both for the graduands and the University as it sums up the efforts of each candidate for the two, three, four, and five or six years they have invested in their study, and that of departments that have facilitated the successful completion of the academic cycle.

As a Directorate we are proud to be associated with the graduands today, especially those who are qualifying for their undergraduate studies. The Board of Undergraduate Studies and Field Attachment Programmes (BUGS/FAP) is responsible for the review of, and recommendation to the Senate on, the quality of undergraduate degree and diploma curricula. The Board also coordinates and facilitates field/industrial attachment (FA) and teaching practice (TP). As such, BUGS interacts with undergraduate students long before they set into class, as the students select their programmes of study and also during industrial/field attachment.

Field Attachment commenced on 26 June 2017. Approximately 1641

students went on Field Attachment and gained hands-on experience in the market place. However, because of the change in the academic programme for 2016/2017 Semester II, Teaching Practice will be done in May 2018, with a total number of 2000-plus students participating in the exercise.

The  $8^{th}$  Cohort of 139 students were attached to various farms across the country between June and August 2017. This programme has grown to about 20 counties.

Egerton University has partnered with Arava International Agricultural Training Centre (AICAT) from June 2016 in enhancing hands-on skills for students undertaking agricultural related sciences. The 11-month programme provides selected students with the opportunity to be attached to farms and farmer organisations in the ARAVA region of Israel for five days in a week, and oneday training at the AICAT Centre.

Over 100 students drawn from four institutions (Egerton University, JKUAT, the National Irrigation Board

and the Kenya Water Institute) participated in the programme in 2016–2017. A feedback meeting was organised by the Israeli Embassy and the Ministry of Water and Irrigation on 28 June 2017 at Fairview Hotel, Nairobi. During this meeting, the Government, represented by the Cabinet Secretary, promised to utilise the graduates from AICAT in the few projects that are lined up for the next phase, such as: Kibwezi, Kibbutz, Galana, Youth Fund and Mwea -MIAD. The students appreciated the opportunity to provide feedback and requested that each institution organises an Israel Alumni network, and where possible involve the students in establishing model farms where people can learn and implement acquired technology.

The 4<sup>th</sup> cohort of 33 students for 2017–2018 reported in Israel for their internship programme, which started in August 2017. The students were flagged off on 24 July 2017 by the Cabinet Secretary for Water and Irrigation, Hon. Eugene Wamalwa, and the Vice-Chancellor, Egerton University, Prof. Rose A. Mwonya, among others.

h e Directorate of Examination and Timetabling falls under the Division of Academic Affairs. Among its responsibilities is to ensure that teaching and learning takes place in a conducive and friendly environment as far as venues are concerned, and that processing and administration of University examinations is conducted in a way that is credible and of high integrity. Besides this, the examination process should also inspire confidence among the key

stakeholders that include students, parents, corporate sponsors, employers and, of course, the government, which is the main funding agent. In conducting its affairs, especially in relation to processing and administering of examinations, and scheduling the timelines for the processing of the results, the Directorate must ensure that it operates in conformity with the rules and regulations set by the Commission for University

Education (CUE).

For quite some time now, Egerton University has been using the Retake system of examination, under which candidates are allowed to transit to the next academic year of their study so long as they have passed at least 50% of the total credit factors of all the courses taught and examined in an academic year. This system has been popular with students as it allows them to avoid repeating a year, while at the same time giving them an opportunity to get a full grade for the retaken course. This is unlike in a Resit examination where the maximum score a student can get is 40% (D grade) in most programmes, or 50% (C) for those in the Faculties of Veterinary Medicine, and Health Sciences, and in post-graduate programmes. These benefits notwithstanding, administering this system efficiently has been problematic and faced with numerous challenges both for the affected students and the lecturers. One of the major weaknesses of this system of allowing students to transit to the next class with a baggage of failed courses is the added workload of affected students. Such workload is likely to interfere with a candidate's progresses to higher levels. Besides, a failed course is often a prerequisite for another course in the next level. and without a good mastery of the prerequisite the candidate finds the going getting tougher and tougher.

Because of these shortcomings of the Retake system, CUE has come up with new guidelines that require all universities to adopt the Supplementary system, which was in fact in place in the past. In

compliance with this regulation from CUE, Egerton University has no alternative but to implement it in total. Under the Supplementary system no candidate is allowed to transit to the next class unless he/she has passed all courses taught and examined in an academic year. If a candidate fails some courses in an academic year, then the candidate is required to take a Resit examination for the failed courses and pass before being allowed to transit to the next class. However, where a student fails to sit for the regular examination due to unavoidable circumstances such as sickness or bereavement the candidate is allowed to sit for a Special Examination during the time when the Supplementary examinations are being offered.

To ensure that the Supplementary system of examination succeeds, the Directorate of Examination and Timetabling will endeavour to prepare the University Academic Calendar and Schedules for Processing of Examination results in good time and also ensure that the set timelines are followed to the letter. This cannot be done by the Directorate alone but will require support from all academic staff.

Finally, all the staff at the Directorate of Examination and Timetabling would like to express our most sincere congratulations to all the graduands and their parents/guardians during this 37<sup>th</sup> Graduation Ceremony. We wish them all the best as they prepare to enter the vibrant and competitive job market to serve mankind in the various disciplines in which they have been trained and examined and will today be given powers to read and to do all that appertains to their respective degrees by the Chancellor.

### Message from the University Librarian

n its efforts to meet the needs of its users, the Library has continued to improve the services it offers and has embarked on creative expansion of the information resources, services as well as the physical infrastructure. In line with this, the University designed an Ultra-Modern Library with a seating capacity of 8,000 users which is about a third of the students' population, as per the Commission of University Education (CUE) Guidelines and Standards. The ground-breaking ceremony for the Ultra-Modern Library took place on 29 June 2017, and was presided over by the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Education, Science and Technology, Dr. Fred Matiang'i. Construction of the same has since commenced and is ongoing. The Ultra-Modern Library will be equipped in a manner that will facilitate the use of modern technology for effective utilisation of information resources, as well as provide improved safety and security to the users and to the library resources. In addition, the building will employ the green concept design to allow maximum ventilation and fenestration.

The Library, through its Nairobi City Campus branch, won a competitive grant worth Ksh50,000 provided from the International Network for the Availability of Scientific Publications (INASP) and the United Nations Educational. Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO). The theme of the competition was "Time to walk the talk of open access". The grant was used to carry out a range of activities aimed at sensitising the faculty and students on the value of open access resources and the institutional repository. The activities included user trainings, a campus-wide classroom tour, a radio talk and the preparation of a manual on how to use open access resources.

On 20 September 2017, Library staff and students participated in this year's Knowledge Ambassadors Workshop and Competition held at the Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT), Juja. The annual event was sponsored by the Emerald Publishing Group, one of the providers of electronic resources that the Library subscribes to through the Kenya Library and Information Services Consortium (KLISC). The students exhibited their innovations in the form of presentations and poems, short plays and songs. Through the event the students and staff were exposed to various topics which included the importance of modern technological tools in research, teaching and learning, issues of academic integrity, use of social media to enhance library services and the role of Emerald Knowledge Ambassadors in promoting the ethical utilisation of electronic resources.

To ensure access and effective utilisation of information resources to students and staff regardless of their location, the Library has acquired and installed the EZproxy software. Through this software, library users can access electronic resources subscribed to by the Library even when away from the University Campuses.

We take this opportunity to congratulate the graduands and wish them all the best in their life endeavours.

A Career Talk on CV writing and work etiquette for students held at Kilimo Hall on 18 October 2017 was conducted by the Kenya Commercial Bank (KCB).

A Gospel Sunday TV show was held on 24 September 2017 at the University Graduation Square and aired on Citizen TV.

The Egerton University Wasps Club, which is registered under the affiliate Kenya Rugby Football Union (KRFU), recorded commendable results. The team finished 2<sup>nd</sup> overall in 2016-2017 KRFU Nationwide League, which has more than 50 registered clubs and universities. This success was facilitated by the incentives and impetus provided by the old boys after donating new uniforms to the team during the 4<sup>th</sup> edition of the Wazee - Vijana tournament that brings on board old boys to play the students. The students are psyched up and preparing for the Kenya Universities' championship slated for 16–22 December, 2017 at the Dedan Kimathi University of Technology. Several teams are expected to represent Egerton in the games. All teams are upbeat and raring to go. Egerton University will certainly rise up to the occasion.

Egerton University has equipped you with the best knowledge to face the industry with courage and confidence. This has been made possible by the standards that the University has set for itself in line with internationally recognised standards. Standards play a critical role in: ensuring the safety, quality and reliability of products, processes and services; efficient production; cost reduction through competition; and supporting regulation. Further, standards are valuable tools for promoting innovation and commercialisation through: the dissemination of new ideas and good practice; validation of new measurement tools and methods; and the implementation of new processes and procedures. The implementation of standards enables the University to identify areas where it has done well, areas that we can further improve upon and gaps that we need to bridge.

To ensure sustained quality of academic programmes Egerton University adopted the requirements of a Quality Management System based on the ISO 9001:2008 Standard. This led the University to

identify and harmonise all the processes, document and uniformly implement them. A conformity assessment mechanism, through both external and internal audits, has been put in place to ensure conformity to internally set standards and compliance to relevant legal and statutory requirements. The performance of this system is reviewed at specified intervals by the University Management Board (UMB) to provide direction and necessary interventions to ensure that customer satisfaction in service delivery is improved and maintained. This standard has since been revised. and efforts are being made to ensure that the University transits to the ISO 9001:2015 Quality Management System. Some of the key features introduced in this standard include: understanding the organisation and its context, risk-based thinking and organisational knowledge. In order for the University to transit to this standard, the ISO Secretariat has drawn a roadmap and the key activities include: training of staff, training of auditors, documentation review, internal audits and eventual application for certification. It is hoped that this process will be completed by the end of 2018.

The Guilford Dairy Institute of Egerton University has also adopted a Food Safety Management System based on the ISO 22000:2005 Standard. Certification to this standard means that the Institute operates within international requirements of food safety. The scope of certification is production of yoghurt and cheese. The Processes identified range from delivery of raw milk up to dispatch/sale of the finished products.

With the implementation of the two standards above, and their direct interaction with the environment, it has become necessary for Egerton University to think in an environmentally conscious manner. The activities involved in the implementation of the Quality Management System and Food Safety Management System may impact on the environment either positively or negatively. Environment-related activities include disposal of waste (both solid and effluent), use of energy and water, handling and disposal of agrochemicals and disposal of ewaste. It is the University's strategic decision to be certified to Environmental Management System based on ISO 14001:2015. This means that as the University strives to meet and exceed customers' and other stakeholders' expectations in delivery of products and services, sound environmental performance will be taken into consideration. Like in the Quality Management System, a road map to certification to the ISO 14001:2015 Environmental Management System has been drawn and a team of staff put in place to ensure the establishment, implementation and maintenance of the system.

## A Paradigm Shift in Community Extension Outreach

gerton University invests substantial resources in research to generate technologies meant to address practical challenges in the agricultural value chains faced by farmers and other agrientrepreneurs. But a recent Master's research thesis in Agricultural Information and Communication Management (AICM) by a Library staff, Millicent Ongondo, concluded that the technologies developed in the University were not reaching the targeted primary beneficiaries. This finding has triggered paradigm shifts in our community extension outreach activities.

The first shift came when Egerton moved from transferring technologies through the University Library mode to the print and TV media mode. The second shift is a policy change affecting postgraduate research outputs. Students and their supervisors are encouraged and facilitated to produce policy briefs out of research results for sharing the solution packages developed with the wider potential beneficiaries. The policy briefs are distributed to the public during open public events, including agricultural shows, exhibitions and field days.

Another shift was informed by a coinnovation as an interactive brokering of knowledge in partnership with a select multistakeholders possessing capacity to bring high impact solutions to the problem of concern. Unlike the linear, technology transfer approaches, co-innovation accelerates the adaptation and adoption of the technologies. We have applied with good success co-innovation with dairy farmers in Lare Ward, a semi-arid land in Nakuru County, to innovate for sustainable and profitable dairy intensification. The project was conceived jointly between Egerton extension staff and a communitybased organisation (CBO) supporting Lare farmers to build resilience to recurring drought events in the area. The staff of the Research and Extension Division worked jointly with the CBO and farmers to respond to a grant call floated by the NWO-WOTRO Food & Business Applied Research Fund (ARF), which was successful. The project was designed with the principles of research-into-use and knowledge co-creation to empower farmers with capacity to integrate knowledge, skills and attitude change towards attaining sustainable dairy intensification. The project is being implemented by Mt Clara Mtakatifu Mwangaza Centre A CBO, and Egerton University in Kenya and Wageningen UR Livestock Research, in The Netherlands.

In the co-innovation process, Egerton University provides technical training on areas prioritised by farmers during a participatory needs assessment and validated and revised in a baseline survey. Training is organised on the CBO farm and on farmers' farms, which farmers themselves select, with the knowledge of who among them is best placed for a given training topic. The training is complemented with organised lesson learning tours to model farmers, farmer cooperatives and the Nakuru National Agricultural Shows. Farmers use the training and lesson learning tours to share, discuss and review their priorities and ideas. Egerton extension staff exercise flexibility and play facilitative roles as farmers reshape the problem and solutions to their dairy intensification process.

Farmers have now formed their cooperative society, with share contributions, in order to ease their access to input and output markets. They have received training from the County Cooperative officers invited by Egerton staff to support capacity building in cooperative management. Collectively, farmers mobilised their own resources with little support from the project to visit a model farmer cooperative in Nyandarua County to learn cooperative management. In another collective action, farmers hired ten acres of land to produce hay from the seeds provided to them by the project. They have approached the County Government for a milk cooler for over 200 litres of milk they now produce daily.

The paradigm shift at work here has to do with the way we engage with communities in extension activities. For high impact extension activities, there is need to do a needs assessment to prioritise interventions. It is important for researchers and facilitators to be flexible so as to adapt to emerging needs and problems, as well as to network so as to expand resource mobilisation.

### **UILO INTENSIFIES CASCADING OF UNIVERSITY'S PRODUCTS**

Some of the research activities that have put Egerton University in the limelight in Kenya, the region and the world include: 1) Bean research towards food security that resulted in the release of three bean varieties; 2) Striga and stem Borer Management in maize-legume cropping systems; and 3) Indigenous Chicken Programme.

In order for the University to effectively disseminate these activities to the public, the University Industry Liaison Office University Education (CUE) Exhibitions, participation in the Agricultural Society of Kenya (ASK) National and International Shows, and hosting of the Annual International Conference and Innovations Week.

A number of activities have occurred at Egerton University recently, conforming its position as a national leader in agriculture.

The  $64^{th}$  World Ploughing Contest organised by ASK was held at Egerton University from 1 - 2

(UILO) was established. The core mandate of this office is to link the University and various industries that will synergise and utilise the research outputs, innovations and inventions from the University.

Some of the avenues that UILO utilises to cascade the University's products include the Commission for December 2017. The UILO office, on behalf of Egerton University, worked with ASK on the coordination of the relevant protocols to make the contest a success. About 20 countries participated. Kenya was the only country from Africa participating in the event. This was the second time the world event was held in Africa. The first time was in Kenya in 1995, again at Egerton University.

The University participated in the 2017 Nakuru National Agricultural Show on 4 – 8 July 2017 under the theme "Promoting Innovation and Technology in Agriculture and Trade". Egerton University emerged top in eight categories, which included position one in five trade stands and three livestock stands. These were the Best University Stand; Best Stand in Research and Development; Best Stand in Agro-Processing; and Best in Innovations & Inventions.

UILO has also attracted and retained effective partnerships through Memoranda of Understanding nationally and internationally. These include collaborations with research and training institutions, private and public institutions, County Government and Non-Governmental Organisations. The University signed an MoU with John Deere of South Africa. Following this MoU, graduates from the Faculty of Engineering and Technology will get internships for six months at the John Deere facilities in Kenya every year. The first two students joined John Deere in April 2017. The other MoU with Industry was signed with Safaricom Kenya, where a customer centre will be established on campus, next to the Institute of Women, Gender and Development Studies. University students will benefit by gaining experience in working at the Institute.

#### **Agro-Science Park in Huge Expansion Plan**

he Agro-Science Park is accelerating the development of products for farming communities through research, innovation, commercialisation and Industry- and County Government-linkages. Through funding support and collaboration with the Confucius Institute, the Park is completing the construction of office, conference facilities, agro-processing storage facilities and irrigation at its 25-acre farm next to the Ngongogeri Farm. Through collaborations with the Ministry of Industrialisation, Trade and Cooperatives (MoITC), the Danish Embassy, Nakuru County, and the Egerton Investment Company, there are plans to expand the Park into an Agro-Industrial Park for the Central Rift on a 200-acre area at Ngongogeri. The establishment of this Agro-Industrial Park is a government initiative that will be hosted by Egerton University under the Kenya Industrial Transformation Programme (KITP), a programme of MoITC anchored on the Vision 2030.

Recently a stakeholders training workshop was held at ARC Hotel, which was officially opened by the DVC (APD), Prof. Isaac O. Kibwage. The workshop was funded by the Danish Embassy (Peter Jacobs) and Industrial Park consultants from Denmark. The participants included Egerton University Directors, scholars and students involved in product development, innovation and agrienterprise. The MoITC was represented by the Director of Industry and Manufacturing, Mr. Hezekiah Okeyo, whereas the World

Bank was represented by Mr. Moses Nyabila. Other participants came from the Nakuru County Government, Kenyatta University and the Nakuru Business Association.

The Park has also continued to produce certified seed of highyielding, improved varieties of beans, pigeon peas (Egerton Mbaazi M1), sorghum, groundnuts, chickpeas and finger millet for both drylands and mid-altitude zones for distribution in several counties, such as Nakuru, Baringo, Elgeyo Marakwet, Laikipia, Trans-Nzoia, and Bomet. To meet the increasing demand for fish fingerlings for onfarm fish production by farmers, the Agro-Science Park has also constructed a modern hatchery in the Fish Farm which produces high quality fingerlings for farming communities and offers training on all fishing technologies. It also offers information on fish feeds and aquaculture farming in the neighbouring counties.

Other products targeted for upscaling within the Agro-Science Park are commercialisation of organic honey, stevia crop, development and commercialisation of indigenous mushrooms spawn (seed) and use of plant-based bioproducts. The Park is also in the process of soliciting funds to meet its mandate of providing incubation space for transforming innovative ideas and products for commercialisation within the University in collaboration with the Industry. It has received some support towards the improvement of agro-processing facilities at the Park through funding by the World Bank Centre of Excellence in Sustainable Agriculture and Agribusiness Management (CESSAM) project and ICRISAT/USAID for new variety promotion and branding in the current financial year.

### **Milestones at Chemeron Dryland Research Training and Ecotourism Centre**

In September 2017, a 755-foot deep borehole was drilled by Fountain Vent Company at the Chemeron Dryland Research Training and Ecotourism Centre (DRTEC). This will bring to an end the frequent water scarcity being experienced at the Centre. The test pumping and water quality results indicated that the borehole will be a reliable source of potable water for the various units at the Centre, including the crocodile, tortoise and snake parks. This water supply will also support livestock keeping, irrigation, a treenursery as well as the residents in the villages surrounding DRTEC. The Centre Director, on behalf of DRTEC staff, appreciates the University Management and the Council for this water project which

will not only transform the lives of staff and area residents but also the trajectory of research and ecotourism activities at the Centre.

Edith Kurui, one of the post-graduate students attached to DRTEC, and whose research was supported through funds allocated to the Centre, published a research paper entitled "Microbial Contamination of Water Pans in Baringo County" in the Journal of Water Sanitation and Hygiene for Development. The paper focuses on the impacts of consumption of water sourced from water pans, and its influence on prevalence of water related diseases.

DRTEC got a boost in its profile after its staff and student researchers, led

by the Director, Dr. George Ogendi, presented their research findings at the 6<sup>th</sup> International Conference on Drylands, Deserts, and Desertification at the Ben Gurion University of the Negev, Israel. The presentations were: "Health Risks Associated with Consumption of Water Sourced from Water Pans in the ASALs: A Case Study of Central and South Baringo, Kenya"; "Impact of Removal of Copper Leaf (Acalyphafruticosa) on Plant Species Diversity and Abundance at Chemeron, Baringo County, Kenya"; and "Rangeland Rehabilitation Using Natural Regeneration and Dryland Afforestation Techniques at Chemeron, Baringo County, Kenya".

#### **Egerton University Rehabilitates Degraded Njoro River**

enya is currently faced with increased environmental degradation owing to uncontrolled pollution of its waters and indiscriminate dumping of nonbiodegradable wastes like plastics. The Vision 2030 blueprint seeks, in part, to address environmental degradation and pollution. It outlines five key areas of interest: i) The Water Catchment Management Initiative; ii) Securing the Wildlife Corridors and Migratory Routes Initiative; iii) The Solid Waste Management System Initiative; iv) The Plastic Bags Initiative; and v) The Land Cover and Land Use Mapping Initiative. Under the Water Catchment Initiative, the government aims to rehabilitate the five main water towers (Mau Escarpment, Mt. Kenya, Aberdare

Ranges, Cherangani Hills, and Mt. Elgon). Rehabilitation of the Njoro River is in line with the main objective of the Kenya Government of achieving a clean and secure environment by the year 2030.

Egerton University established a coordination team under the Division of Research and Extension to oversee the rehabilitation of Njoro River. The river runs for about 60 km from the source to the mouth, of which 12 km border the University. Being the main river that drains into Lake Nakuru and a source of livelihood for the community, there is need for rehabilitation. Rehabilitation efforts include community sensitisation seminars, planting of riparian tree seedlings, clearing of dump sites, controlled dumping of wastes and water quality monitoring. Community-based initiatives include establishment of tree nurseries, construction of watering troughs, community training on environment, involvement of primary school pupils in rehabilitation and community sensitisation during ASK shows. So far the University has succeeded in rehabilitating 12 kms of the river in collaboration with the Kenya Agricultural and Livestock Research Organisation (KALRO), Njoro, and about 25 acres at the source in collaboration with the Maasai community.

The quality of water and the volume has increased since the year 2012. The water volume estimated before

rehabilitation in March 2012 was 25 l/s but has since increased to about 80 l/s by March 2017. Conductivity decreased from 280  $\mu$ s/cm in 2012 to about 160  $\mu$ s/cm. Total Suspended Solids (TSS) decreased from 19.5 in the year 2012 to about 12 mg/l by

2017. Total Phosphorus also decreased from 0.25 mg/l to 0.10 mg/l in the same period. This demonstrates that if efforts are made to focus on the whole river, there could be dramatic improvement in the overall water quality of this river

within a very short time. The University will be replanting 5000 indigenous tree seedlings and will hold three community sensitisation seminars in the current financial year (2017–2018).

#### **CMRT and CIMMYT Collaborate on Impactful SIMLESA Project**

new competitive collaborative project is underway in the Crop Management Research Training Centre (CMRT) Project. The project "Impacting on Productivity and Livelihoods of Smallholder Households through Sustainable Intensification of Conservation Agriculture Based Maize-Legume Systems in Western Kenya (SIMLESA)" was a competitive granting system project bid for by experts from Egerton University through the CMRT collaboration with CIMMYT. The project is funded by the Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research (ACIAR).

The main objective of this project is to enhance crop productivity and livelihood resilience among smallholder farmers by scaling out conservation agriculture-based sustainable intensification practices and technologies in maize-legume systems. The scientists in the project are therefore mainstreaming IR maize (FRC425)/legume intercropping systems and habitat management systems (HMS) through experimental result demonstrations installed in smallholder farms for enhanced striga and stem borer management, improved soil fertility and crop productivity.

The project's expected outcomes are: increased number of farmers adopting striga tolerant maize-based farming system for enhanced food and nutrition security; and increased crop productivity through adoption of the Habitat Management System (HMS).

Results of the first season trials have shown impressive striga control by the IR maize and improved overall productivity where intercropping with common legumes (beans/soybeans/ groundnuts) was done. Farmers are being encouraged to select their most beneficial cropping options from the presented mixes for upscaling in their farms. This project is designed to run for three cropping seasons within which a targeted 30,000 households will be exposed to the technologies and approximately 37% of them expected to be adopting them. The project was bid for by the late Prof. Isaiah Tabu, Prof. Richard Mulwa, Prof. Joshua Ogendo, Prof. George Owuor and Prof. Samuel Mwonga.

#### **Tegemeo Institute Gets a New Director**

egemeo Institute has a new Director. This is Dr. Miltone Ayieko. Dr. Ayieko took over leadership at the Tegemeo Institute of Agricultural Policy and Development of Egerton University, beginning August 2017. His predecessor, Dr. Mary Mathenge, led the Institute for the past eight years. Prior to his

appointment, Dr. Ayieko was a Senior Research Fellow in charge of Outreach, Communication and Partnerships at the Institute, and the Regional Coordinator of the Integrated Seed Sector Development Programme in Africa (ISSD Africa), whose secretariat has been hosted at Tegemeo Institute for about three years. Before joining Tegemeo Institute, Dr. Ayieko was a lecturer at Egerton University's Department of Agricultural Economics and Agribusiness Management, where he taught Agricultural Policy, Agricultural Marketing and International Trade, among other courses.

Dr. Ayieko, who holds a doctorate degree in Agricultural, Food and Resource Economics from Michigan State University, USA, has more than 15 years' experience in agricultural policy research. His research has focused on rural livelihoods, seed systems, market development, technology adoption and agricultural value chain analysis. He has also

served in various ministerial taskforces and committees and advised on key policy initiatives to transform the agricultural sector in Kenya. Specifically, he served on the Ministry of Agriculture's Standing Committee on Seed that provided input for the formulation of Kenya's Seed Policy, and was a member of the technical committee of the Vision 2030. He will now spearhead Tegemeo Institute's research, analysis and outreach agenda in ensuring that the Institute pursues its mandate of providing credible research and knowledge for accountability and learning to catalyse agricultural and rural transformation.

Tegemeo Institute and Egerton University as a whole wish him well and offer him full support as he begins his term. Through his leadership, Tegemeo looks forward to continue engaging with stakeholders and informing the agricultural policy formulation agenda in the country and beyond.

#### **TEGEMEO USES EVIDENCE TO INFLUENCE POLICY**

In responding to the need to have policies in the agricultural sector backed by evidence, Tegemeo Institute conducts studies that aim to generate this evidence for sharing with policy makers. One such study is the food situation assessment of key staples and their costs of production in Kenya that has been carried out annually since 2012.

Maize is the most important staple food in the country, accounting for two-thirds of daily calorie intake for K e n y a n s. H e n c e, maize is synonymous with food. In a study carried out for the 2017/18 cropping year, the key findings indicated that the nation was likely to face a maize deficit due to erratic rainfall and fall army worm infestation. The Institute disseminated findings from the 2017 study to stakeholders, key among them the Kenya Government, at a breakfast meeting held on 6 October 2017. Key recommendations were that the government needs to step in and introduce strategic measures such as securing maize imports early enough, to cushion Kenyans from hunger and avoid a repeat of what was witnessed early in the year when food prices soared.

It is gratifying for the Institute to note that the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries (MoALF) not only reached out to the Institute to get findings from the survey, but the Ministry further used the survey findings in making key decisions for the strategic grain reserve. The Ministry and the Strategic Food Reserve Board used the information generated by Tegemeo on costs of maize production in the 2017/18 cropping year to recommend the price at which the government will purchase maize from farmers for the strategic reserves.

Granted the support by key stakeholders and development partners, the Institute will continue to track key indicators and to offer sound, coherent and empirically-based policy options that will effectively contribute to the country's development and efforts to reduce food insecurity and poverty.

Through consultative meetings between them, the Acting Chief Halls Officer, the Catering Officer, the Chief Security Officer, the Dean of Students, the Water & Sewerage In-Charge, the Students' Union of Egerton University (SUEU) leaders and other representatives, there has been an easing in some of the challenges facing students' welfare and thus, improvement of service delivery, particularly in the halls of residence. Permitting early registration of the 2017 first-year cohort of students in July and August, two months prior to the opening date of 28 August 2017, enabled smooth registration of students and made it possible for them to settle early enough to attend orientation programmes. The booking and acquiring of accommodation in the University halls of residence was free and fair because of the introduction of an online booking system. It has been proposed, however, that booking for rooms be allowed over the month of May to give equitable access to students who might be living in farflung areas without internet connectivity. An additional bed

capacity of approximately 1,763 has helped boost accommodation capacity for students. Currently there is occupancy of over 8,960 students.

Rumps and desk counters are being made or adjusted for the benefit of persons with disabilities. A CCTV and Scanner equipment have been connected to the brail system for enhancing visual communication. Disability mainstreaming and sensitisation has been done for approximately 90 persons. Assessment of students with disability will be done at the University by the National Council of Persons with Disabilities (NCPD).

There has been a reduction of assaults and theft cases within the halls of residence because of engaging students in the *Nyumba Kumi* monitoring and reporting system. A consultative meeting on security issues with the larger Egerton Community (including the Njoro Ward MCA, Chiefs, Assistant Chiefs and Village Elders) was held on 31 October 2017 following the 26 October repeat presidential election. This meeting was able to get an assurance from the community leaders of the safety of Egerton University students, and provided a platform for future engagements that will enhance peaceful co-existence and prosperity through businesses.
