

Egerton University Gets New Chairman of Council

abinet Secretary for Education Hon. Dr. Amina Mohammed has appointed Amb. Dr. Hukka Wario as the Chairman of Council of Egerton University. The appointment, published through Gazette Notice 9713 in a Special Issue of the Kenya Gazette (Vol. CXX—No. 117) released on 21 September, is for a period of three years, with effect from 6 September 2018.

Dr. Hukka Wario has excelled in academic and diplomatic service. He is an independent

lecturer, researcher and writer. He has previously served as the Chairman of Council of Garissa University College. He was also the Chairman of the Taskforce on Establishing the University of Marsabit (2016).

Dr. Wario holds a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) degree in Linguistics Science from the University of Reading, UK, a Masters of Education (M.Ed.) degree, and a Bachelor of Education (B.Ed., Arts) degree, both from the University of Nairobi.

New Chairman of Council

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As Senior Lecturer, Dr. Wario spearheaded the designing of academic programmes in Linguistics and became the Chairman of Department of Linguistics at Moi University, where he worked between 1987 and 1998.

He was High Commissioner, Plenipotentiary and Extraordinary of the Republic of Kenya to the Republics of Zimbabwe and Mozambique and to the Kingdoms of Lesotho and Swaziland from 1998 to 2002. In 2002, he was also the Assistant to Kenya's Special Envoy to Somalia, under the IGAD Somali National Reconciliation Conference (SNRC) steering the Somali Peace Talks. He was Kenya's Representative to the International Network for Bamboo and Rattan (INBAR), based in China. He was Ambassador, Plenipotentiary and Extraordinary of the Republic of Kenya to the People's Republic of China between 2002 and 2003.

Within the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Dr. Wario was, at various times, Head of the Middle East Division, Director of Administration, and Head of the Research and Policy Analysis Division. In the latter capacity, he was at the heart of the formulation of Kenya's Foreign Policy.

Dr. Wario has served as Permanent Secretary in three ministries, i.e. the Ministry of Home Affairs under the Office of the Vice-President, where he worked together with others and brought about Prison Reforms; the Ministry of the East African Community, where he facilitated the expansion of the East African Community to include the Republics of Rwanda and Burundi and the fasttracking of the East African Political Federation; and the Ministry of State for the Development of Northern Kenya and other Arid Lands.

As a retired Civil Servant, Dr. Wario was the Director for National Anti-Corruption Campaign Steering Committee, under the Ministry of Justice, National Cohesion and Constitutional Affairs in 2010–2012; and the Chairman of the Transition Authority Selection Panel.

Dr. Wario was conferred the award and honour of the Moran of the Order of the Burning Spear (MBS) in 2004, and the Chief of the Burning Spear (CBS) of the Republic of Kenya in 2006.

EUICO Records Impressive Turn-around

gerton University Investment Company (EUICO) was incorporated on 30 June 2010 as a Company through the Company's Act Cap 486 of the Laws of Kenya and is fully owned by Egerton University. This investment arm of the University manages three units: a two-star ARC Hotel, the Lord Egerton Castle, and the 2728-acre Ngongogeri Farm. The Company has been undergoing a turn-around programme under the new management that took over in March 2017 after challenges in the performance of the farm. The Board Members of EUICO include Mr. Joash Otieno (Chairman), Prof. Rose A. Mwonya, Mrs. Esther Mukoa Wabuge, Prof. Isaac O. Kibwage, Mr. Joseph Mwaura Kamau, and Prof. George Owuor. One and a half years down the line, EUICO has seen progressive gains in operational performance.

ARC Hotel

The Agriculture Resources Centre (ARC) Hotel was set up in 1984. It is located within the University in a quiet serene environment for corporate, group, family and individual accommodation, and conference facilities. Over the past thirty years, the hotel has successfully created a presence in the market and now is opening up new frontiers of business including a Bakery, a Coffee Shop and confectioneries. The hotel offers first-class services and a variety of menus ranging from African dishes, English Dishes, French Dishes, Chinese Dishes and other cuisines.

Lord Egerton Castle and Resort

The Lord Egerton Castle was built in the 1930s by Lord Maurice Egerton of Tatton from the United Kingdom. It provides a serene environment with well-manicured grounds making it an ideal setting for corporate, group,

family and individual activities such as team building, workshops, weddings, parties and excursions. A visit to this magnificent 52 room monument will leave visitors with unforgettable memories. It is located in Ngata, 12 kms north of Nakuru Town on the Nakuru-Eldoret Highway.

The Castle is making positive returns and is able to pay its staff and return a profit. The Castle is undergoing a facelift involving the reinstatement of the main ballroom, repainting the outside walls of the whole building, and refurbishing the lavatories and gate house. These are already at an advanced stage and are expected to be completed by the end of 2018.

Ngongogeri Farm

The Ngongogeri Farm became part of Egerton University in 1958, as per the will of Lord Egerton, who died in that year. The current enterprises on the farm are dairy cattle, sheep, poultry, maize, wheat, pasture, barley and a variety of horticultural crops.

Under crop farming, the farm comprises 130 acres of seed maize contracted by Kenya Seed Company (KSC), 320 acres of commercial maize, and 70 acres of silage maize. It also has 410 acres of Boma Rhodes seed grass under contract with KSC, 150 acres of seed barley under East African Breweries contract, 410 acres of seed wheat under KSC contract, and 20 acres under vegetables.

The farm also runs a comprehensive dairy programme involving a semi-zero grazing that has seen milk production per cow grow from a mere five litres per cow /day in 2015/16 to over 15 litres per cow/day in the 2017/18 Financial Year. Consequently, the average milk production per day from the farm has grown from 200 litres per day in 2015/16 to 950 litres per day at present. Milking cows have also grown from 88 in January 2017 to 116, with a total herd size of 326 cows.

The farm also opened an ATM pasteurised milk dispensing service to enhance its cash income for operations, a decision that has seen growth in milk incomes. A steers programme that supplies meat for sale on a daily basis has also been introduced. Furthermore, the farm re-established the collapsed poultry unit and it is producing broilers on a monthly basis. The current stock of 2,000 birds are already on sale at a cost of Ksh.400.00 each. The farm has over 500 sheep which produce wool and mutton for sale.

Joint Research on Water Management Meeting

On 8 August 2018 Vice-Chancellor Prof. Rose A. Mwonya met at Egerton University with Mr. Robert Burtscher from the International Institute for Applied Systems Analysis (IIASA, Austria), and Mr. Michael Hauser from the International Crops Research Institute for the Semi-Arid Industry experts from K e n y a , T a n z a n i a , Zimbabwe, and China gave in-depth presentations that focused on the theme "African Trade Platform with Global Agrochemical Industry"

> Tropics (ICRISAT). They discussed joint research on simulation of agricultural water management practices in East Africa. The discussion also looked at the possibility of Egerton University becoming a local partner in a proposed project titled "Accelerating Transition towards Resilient Water Resources Management". The project is part of IIASA's Water Futures and Solutions (WFaS) Initiative. The WFaS Initiative is a groundbreaking study

into sustainable solutions to meet local, national, and global water challenges. IIASA and Lake Victoria Basin Commission (LVBC) are lead partners while ICRISAT is a major collaborator in the project.

Vice-Chancellor Receives Delegation from Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation

Vice-Chancellor Prof. Rose A. Mwonya on 29 August 2018 received a delegation from the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation led by Prof. Hamadi Boga, Principal Secretary for Agriculture and Research. The team met with members of the University Management Board and University researchers to discuss mitigation of agricultural challenges Kenya is facing through research. The team was later taken through a tour of the University's Agro-Science and Tatton Agriculture Parks.

The Directorate of Quality Assurance (DQA) congratulates all the graduands for their academic achievements, which have led to this special day. DQA envisions being a centre of excellence in the creation and growth of a culture of continuous quality improvement in the University. Here are a few highlights of this year.

Teaching Effectiveness Evaluation Digitalised

DQA routinely conducts Teaching

Effectiveness Evaluation (TEE) and Practical Instruction Effectiveness Evaluation (PIEE) in line with the Commission for University Education (CUE), Universities Standards and Guidelines (2014), PROG/STD/15, which require every Lecturer/ Technologist to be evaluated at least once in an academic year.

The DVC (AA)'s office in conjunction with DQA in January 2018 launched the new Teaching Effectiveness Management System (TIEMS) whereby the evaluation will be done online saving time relative to the earlier manual system. TIEMS was piloted in the second semester of 2017/2018 academic year and will be used as from the first semester of 2018/2019 academic year.

External Examiners' Reports

Departments invite External Examiners (EE) to moderate their examinations. Each EE prepares a report which is submitted to the Vice-Chancellor. All reports are subsequently forwarded to DQA for analysis and preparation of a synthesised summary report which is presented to the University Senate. The recommendations of the report, once approved by the Senate, are implemented by faculties and departments. Deans and CoDs update the Senate on the implementation status of the recommendations. DQA prepared an analysis of the External Examiners summarised report for the 2016/17 academic year, and the document was discussed by the Board of Quality Assurance and the Deans Committee. Deans/Directors will submit templates for addressing issues raised.

Evaluation of Academic Programmes

Academic programmes that have undergone a full cycle of implementation are required to undergo self-assessments. Deans of faculties, in consultation with CoDs, identify programmes that are due for evaluation and forward them to DQA. The Directorate conducted a mid-term review training for departmental teams to assess the progress reports, challenges and the way forward on the self-assessment of programmes for 2017/2018 academic year.

The Faculty of Agriculture (FOA) through major faculty-wide projects has attracted local and regional students into both undergraduate and post-graduate programmes. Currently we have more than 250 students supported by the World Bank through the African Centre of Excellence in Sustainable Agriculture and Agribusiness Management (CESAAM) Project, the MasterCard Foundation in Africa through the Transforming African Agricultural Universities to meaningfully contribute to Africa's growth and development (TAGDev), and the African Development Bank (ADB) through "Training of existing staff in public universities and other tertiary institutions in the field of livestock and agricultural biosciences programmes".

Six regionally-oriented short courses were developed by FOA staff through CESAAM in collaboration with the Nelson Mandela African Institute of Science and Technology of Arusha, Tanzania. CESAAM, in collaboration with Virginia Tech, USA, also developed and offered a short course on "Research Analytics and Writing Fundable Proposals".

FOA academicians have made the following commendable achievements recently: (1) A team from FOA consulted for the Kenya Defence Forces (KDF) for the designing and construction of a food processing factory at Gilgil. The team was led by Prof. Abdul K. Faraj (Food Processing), Dr. John Nduko (Food Safety), Dr. Robert Gesimba (Horticulture), and the late Mr. Amos Nzinga (Food Engineering), who has now been replaced by Dr. George Owino. Phase I (processing of dehydrated vegetables) of the factory was recently commissioned by His Excellency the President and Commander-in-Chief of KDF, Uhuru Kenyatta.

(2) Dr. John Nduko and team were declared the winners of the 2018 Federal Laboratory Consortium for Technology Transfer (FLC) Mid-Atlantic Regional Excellence in Technology Transfer Award through their research on "Unlocking the Protein Potential of Grasshoppers and Locusts". Other members in the team are Prof. J. Ogendo and Drs. A. Kingori, F. Toroitich, O. Ingasia, E. Mbuthia and J. Ondiek. Dr. Nduko will be travelling to the USA to receive the Award.

I wish the graduands all the best as they join other Kenyans in nation-building.

The election was held on 2 November 2018, and had attracted two other candidates: Prof. Patience Mshenga of the Department of Agricultural Economics and Agribusiness Management and Dr. Robert Gesimba of the Department of Crops, Horticulture and Soil Science.

University Incubates Innovations and Business Ideas

B gerton University is implementing a project aimed at strengthening the capacity in the livestock value chain. The project is funded by the Dutch Organisation for Internationalisation in Education (NUFFIC) and is being implemented in collaboration with Q-Point, Maastricht School of Management (MSM), HAS University of Applied Sciences, Growth Africa, DLV, and Rabobank.

The project has its origins in the iLINOVA (www.ilinova.org) initiative that focused on strengthening capacity for participatory management of indigenous livestock to encourage agricultural innovation in Eastern, Southern and Western Africa. The initiative was coordinated by Egerton University in collaboration with Lilongwe University of Agriculture and Natural Resources (LUANAR), Malawi, and Obafemi Awolowo University (OAU), Nigeria.

One of the key tasks of iLINOVA was to establish a Centre of Excellence for Livestock Innovation and Business (CoELIB) that builds on existing capacity and fosters innovation and agri-business development. CoELIB was officially launched in June 2016 at the Inaugural 1^{st} World Congress on I n n o v a t i o n f o r L i v e s t o c k Development that was held in Kenya and attended by representatives from all over the world.

Since its inception in 2016, CoELIB (<u>www.coelib.org</u>) has developed and offered a number of products and services to achieve the planned output as outlined below.

Incubation, Business and Market Development: The cluster of products and services provided within the incubation, business and market development theme target students, innovative entrepreneurs and community members and provide support for the establishment of new business, growing existing businesses, taking products to market and linking entrepreneurs with opportunities.

Information, Technical Assistance and Consulting: CoELIB develops information resources and offers technical assistance and consulting in the key domains of innovative technology, business and market development.

Research, Development and Commercialisation: CoELIB has expanded the production of knowledge relevant to the growth and productivity of business ventures. The Centre is not in the business of developing knowledge for the sake of knowledge. CoELIB contributes to the application of knowledge derived from research to address the most pressing problems in society. Within the incubation programme, CoELIB has achieved the following goals: access for clients to facilities (laboratories, office, and learning) and think tanks (for business information, technology, innovation, markets, and entrepreneurship); linkages for clients to access finances, ideas, risk insurance, loans, and markets; incubation of business ideas and innovations for clients through direct contact with clients and non-clients (nationally and regionally) on the virtual interface; and business start-up advice, mentorship, and guidance

Since the inception of CoELIB, over 20 businesses and companies have been incubated, while over 13 businesses and companies are currently being incubated. All the startups are registered and are up and running.

The Director of CoELIB is Prof. Alexander K. Kahi.

CESAAM Success Stories

In the course of the year, the Centre of Excellence in Sustainable Agriculture and Agribusiness Management (CESAAM), based at Egerton University made important strides forward in a number of areas. Among them are the ones outlined below.

Student Enrollment

CESAAM now has a total of 164 students, with 20% of this number being from the region. Of the total, 49% are female students. The Ph.D. students comprise 34%, with the rest being M.Sc. students.

Short Courses Developed

CESAAM in partnership with the Centre for Research, Agricultural Advancement, Teaching Excellence and Sustainability in Food and Nutritional Security (CREATES) hosted at the Nelson Mandela African Institute of Science and Technology (NM-AIST), Virginia Tech College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, and other private sector partners developed 10 Regional Skill-Based Courses in sustainable agriculture and agribusiness management. These courses address emerging issues in agriculture and are tailor-made to serve the industry, farmers, students and faculty.

Self-Assessment and Benchmarking of Programmes

CESAAM, in partnership with Virginia Tech College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, is now undertaking a process

of self-assessment/evaluation of two programmes (M.Sc. and Ph.D. in Agribusiness Management and M.Sc. and Ph.D. in Crop Protection) in preparation for an international benchmarking exercise. This exercise is expected to run up to April 2019. Selected CESAAM faculty took part in a self-assessment exercise from 12 to 15 September 2018. This exercise then produced reports which followed the IUCEA Guideline on Self-assessment that were shared with Virginia Tech. CESAAM now looks forward to hosting selected faculty from Virginia Tech to look into aspects of reviewing these programmes.

Proposed Exchange

CESAAM, in partnership with Nanjing Agricultural University (NAU), is now in top gear to sponsor six Ph.D. students for an Exchange Fellowship at NAU. The six students, Hezekiah Korir, Lilian Okiro, Jane Odero, Robert Mwesigwa, Amos Adongo and Victor Kilui are drawn from the Departments of Crops, Horticulture and Soils; Animal Sciences; Food Science; and Agricultural Economics and Agribusiness Management; all are under CESAAM.

Proposed Twinning Programme in M.Sc. Agribusiness Management

CESAAM in collaboration with Zhejiang University in China has come up with a concept to innovatively deliver M.Sc. in Agribusiness Management. This twinning programme is seen as an approach to ensure regional mobility of graduates to give them a global perspective of Agribusiness and Agri-enterprise Development issues.

Internship for CESAAM Students

CESAAM has awarded 12 students to proceed for a two-month internship programme with private and research institutions in the region. Three of the students have been interned at Kenya Agricultural and Livestock Research Organisation (KALRO), five are at the Community Action for Rural Development (CARD) and four at The Hive Company Limited, which has a presence in 16 African Countries.

Participation in the National Agricultural Trade Fair

CESAAM has a robust exhibitions team. This marketing strategy through exhibitions is also supported by an active presence online (Twitter, LinkedIn and cesaam.egerton.ac.ke website). The Centre exhibited at the Nakuru ASK Show in June 2018 and scooped awards in various categories including that of Youth Enterprise Development.

In addition to the foregoing, the Centre exhibited during the RUFORUM Biennial Conference in Nairobi in October 2018. During this activity, CESAAM, in partnership with Virginia Tech CALS, co-sponsored two side events on Partnerships for Development and on Social Safeguard meant to eliminate sexual harassment in universities. The Centre also took part in the EAC-IUCEA APPPF Forum that took place in Nairobi earlier this year.

Today's world brings innumerable opportunities but also critical challenges that we must solve through collective effort in order for us to move forward as individuals or communities. Among the challenges are those that are socio-cultural, economic, and political in nature. It is the responsibility of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences to equip learners with the knowledge and skill to confront such challenges. The Faculty has four departments – the Department of Economics; the Department of Philosophy, History and Religious Studies; the Department of Literature, Languages and Linguistics; and the Department of Peace, Sociology and Security Studies – through which it pursues this objective.

In the course of the year, the Faculty has been working on developing new curricular in our determination to ensure that we are equipping our students with the best knowledge available and linking them to the job market. For example, we have developed a new diploma programme in Criminology and Security Studies that is already admitting students. Secondly, we are working on a Bachelor of Arts programme in Political Science.

Prof. Tabitha Kanogo has donated over seventy books to the Department of Philosophy, History and Religious Studies. Prof. Kanogo is based in the US teaching History courses at the University of California, Berkeley. She is a resident of Nakuru and has a special attachment to the Department and Egerton University. Her most important book, Squatters and the Roots of Mau Mau (1987) was based on field work done at Njoro, Elburgon and Olenguruone. Her other major study is African Womanhood in Colonial Kenya, 1900–1950 (2005). These two are among the books donated to the Department. Other books are multidisciplinary in nature, dealing with Kenyan and African history, gender, religion, philosophy, politics and all aspects of knowledge production in Africa. The Department appreciates with gratitude these additions to the Department Library. The library has also benefitted from the large collection of books donated earlier by Prof. Donald Crummey from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, USA.

The Faculty are fully cognizant of the fact that in order for our students to develop into fully rounded human beings their appropriation of the knowledge we provide to them must be complemented by strong extracurricular activities. For this reason, the Faculty, in conjunction with its student leaders, regularly organises workshops, seminars, and sporting activities. For example, on 6 July 2018, the Faculty held a workshop entitled "Career Advancement and Entrepreneurship Seminar" during which representatives from the Young African Leadership Initiative (YALI), Barclays Bank (Nakuru), Egerton University's National Integration Committee, and Laikipia University gave presentations to the students. Similarly, on 19 October 2018, the Faculty held a workshop entitled "The Second Career Advancement and Entrepreneurship Workshop" that drew participation from speakers with wide-ranging professional backgrounds and perspectives. The first workshop involved more than six hundred students. The second one involved all the newly admitted firstyear students in the Faculty.

On 29 June 2018, FASS students participated in an "Inter-Faculty Football Tournament" held in the University's Sports Grounds. On 9 July 2018, the student professional associations in the Faculty held a debate on the topic "Is the Global War against Terror a Mirage or Can it be Won?" Finally, on 19 October 2018 representative students from the Faculty participated in a football tournament that brought together FASS and the Faculty of Science.

Egerton Community Taekwondo Academy

gerton Community Taekwondo Academy is a group of people from Egerton University and the entire neighbouring community, with over 100 members of all ages. The academy is located at the Community Resource Centre along Njoro, Mau Narok Road, opposite the Njoro Canning Gate.

With the support of the Dean, Faculty of Arts and Social Studies (FASS), the Academy was allocated a training hall. Currently it offers Taekwondo classes, Aerobics, Weight Management, SelfDefence, Kick Boxing, Acrobatics, Dancing, Karate, and Drama.

The Academy focuses on nurturing the talents of young and upcoming leaders. It has participated in an International Taekwondo Tournament in Rwanda and in National Tournaments, where participants have been a warded 16 Trophies, 27 Gold Medals, 42 Silver Medals, and 18 Bronze Medals.

The Academy has qualified trainers and instructors who monitor the club

members and visitors who train with the club. We welcome all to join the club for physical fitness. The Academy believes in "Physical Fitness for Good Health". Charles Ratemo is the current Head Coach of Egerton University Taekwondo Team.

The Academy is grateful for the continuous generous support of the DVC (AA), Prof. Alexander K. Kahi, and other well wishers among the Egerton University Staff and the community members.

Egerton Scholars in Development Work with Marsabit County

team of scholars from Egerton University was Lrecently awarded two consultancy services by the Marsabit County Government in the areas of development planning and livestock industry. Prof. Fugich Wako of the Department of Literature, Languages and Linguistics, who initiated the engagement of the University with the County Government, invited consultants from the multidisciplinary fields of education and human resources, humanities and social sciences, pastoralism and range management, and veterinary sciences. The first project consisted in reviewing the 2013-2017 Marsabit County Integrated Development Plan (CIDP). To complete this task, the team members conducted a field survey by collecting data from the very people whom the planned development targeted. The consultants are in a position to establish whether or not the planned

development, through Devolution, has effectively changed the lives of people as envisaged by the County projects and programmes. The project was carried out by Prof. Frederick Ngesa, Prof. Fugich Wako, Prof. Abdullahi Aboud and Dr. Maurice Udoto.

The second project involved a review of a planned meat processing plant that is set to improve value addition to the livestock industry in the County. Marsabit is the second largest county in Kenya after Turkana and has a livestock population estimated at over 4 million sheep, goats, cattle and camels. For lack of a good market, the farmers are forced to ferry their livestock over a long distance to Isiolo, Nairobi and Mombasa. An operational abattoir in the county will be a game changer and once development partners support it through public and private partnership, the project is expected to go a long way in improving the lives of farmers and contribute to the realisation of the Kenya Government Big Four Agenda, especially in terms of Food Security and Industrialisation. The team of experts who signed the contract was led by the Acting DVC (Research and Extension), Prof. Alfred Kibor. Other members of the team are Prof. Charles Muleke, Prof. Frederick Ngesa, Prof. Fugich Wako, Prof. Bockline Bebe and Dr. Stanley Makindi. The consultants are tasked with carrying out gap analysis in the conceptualisation, design and the implementation of the abattoir, its location, structure, marketability and environmental and social impact, as well as to suggest a way forward towards achieving a nationally and internationally competitive modern meat processing plant.

The consultancies are worth over Kshs7 million.

The mentors help to illuminate the real stories and experience of girls and boys in these communities through the LitClubs where the pupils participate in reading, writing and storytelling activities that help them to develop a positive attitude and values including: belonging, curiosity, friendship, kindness, confidence, courage and hope. The aim is to grow and celebrate these strengths in the pupils and to encourage them to pledge to take action so that we can build a better world together.

On 11 October 2018,

FEDCOS staff, in collaboration with the RVRA through the LitClubs through which lecturers mentor young primary school girls and boys, celebrated the United Nations International Day of the Girl at the New Dining Hall at Egerton University. There were 75 primary school girls representing five girlsonly LitClubs and 75 boys representing five boys-only LitClubs from 10 primary schools neighbouring Egerton University.

On the Day of the Girl, Herstory communities celebrate with a Herstory Summit. These summits are two-three hour events that bring together community members to learn from one another's stories of strength, celebrate women and girls in their communities, and think about how they can take action to lessen the challenges faced by women and girls in their own communities around the world. Message from the Dean

n behalf of myself and of the Faculty of Engineering and Technology (FET), I would like to take this opportunity to wholeheartedly congratulate the graduating students for a job well done.

The Engineering profession plays a critical role in responding to the needs of the society, and FET is at the centre of realising this through its four departments. These are Agricultural Engineering, Civil and Environmental Engineering, Industrial and Energy Engineering, and Electrical and Control Engineering.

These departments run programmes that create knowledge with practical application, which enables the graduates from the Faculty to be innovative and marketable. The practical experience is inculcated through three industrial attachments, two of which are internal and afford the students the opportunity to directly engage and execute engineering applications. The model enables them to be acquainted with major areas of the engineering discipline as well as diversifies their knowledge. The result is that they become competitive and are preferred in placement.

Among the companies that have opened their doors to our graduates in the last two years are Crown Beverages LTD of Molo (which has absorbed 11 graduates in recent times) and John Deere (which has absorbed three).

Concerning the engineering projects that the Faculty is involved in, the Department of Industrial and Energy Engineering (IEE) has been participating in the development of the KDF food processing factory in Gilgil, within the framework of an MoU signed by the Military and Egerton University. In line with the stipulations of the framework, the Faculty was involved in the design of the plant and support facilities, including machinery identification/matching, installation, and commissioning of the plant. In particular, staff from IEE Department advised on the type of design required, the sizing of the process machineries, and the installation and commissioning of the factory.

In the Department of Agricultural Engineering, staff members are currently involved in the design of various farm machinery, including a feed mixer, a sorghum thresher, a pneumatic chaff cutter, and a winnower. These innovations form the building blocks of the emerging industrialisation in the country, since they are versatile and can readily be used at the farm level by small-scale farmers, who form the bulk of the rural communities.

In addition, a grain drier has been developed that is capable of drying one ton of grains in one hour. The machinery enables maize grain to be dried in-house independent of weather conditions. The idea is good because it solves the problem of open-air drying.

The Department of Agricultural Engineering has made significant progress in training of undergraduate and post-graduate students as well as promoting research activities. For instance, the Department has acquired a total of 22 scholarships for its postgraduate students from the African Development Bank (AfDB) through the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology. Fourteen of the students concerned were admitted into the Master of Science programme, while eight were admitted into the Doctor of Philosophy programme in Agricultural Engineering.

In its determination to boost its research activities, the Department has established a Centre for Integrated Water and Basin Management (CiWaB) that focuses on four key pillars relating to the water sector: water governance, catchment protection and rehabilitation; value-added water resources data; economic water use and investments; and water use efficiency and livelihood diversification. In the course of the year, the project has facilitated training for various categories of professionals in Remote Sensing and QGIS Technology.

The Department is also deeply involved in the nation-wide efforts to train farmers and the youth in water usage as a means of improving agricultural output in the country. In this respect, the Department has initiated a project entitled "Strengthening Capacities for Agricultural Education Research and Adoption in Kenya" (SCARA). Among other things, the project seeks to increase the adoption rates of water for food at the farm level, to involve more youth in agriculture, to address water and food security issues, to establish networking channels among the participants, and to promote the concept of ICT for Agriculture (ICT4Ag). The project has taken key strides in that regard.

With respect to the required continuous professional development of Engineers, Engineers from FET consistently participate in the Engineering Board of Kenya (EBK)organised symposia. Amajor event that took place this year was the UNESCO 5th Africa Engineering Week and the 3rd Africa Engineering Conference, which was held in Mombasa from 17 to 21 September 2018. The main theme of

The Faculty of Environment and Resources Development (FERD) is a multi-disciplinary, dynamic, client and research-oriented facility, dedicated to training human capacity and conducting research in all aspects of natural resource, environmental management and socioeconomic development. The Faculty offers strong teaching, research and outreach programmes leading to Certificate, Diploma, Bachelor of Science, Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy degrees in Natural Resources Management, Forestry, Environmental Science, Geography and Ecotourism and Hospitality Management.

The programmes in the Faculty emphasise "hands-on" experience to equip students with practical research skills for mitigating and/or solving both local and global environmental problems. Students are required to take core and elective courses, but specialise in any of the Faculty thematic areas: Environmental Planning and Management, Natural Resource Management, Earth Science Systems, Environment and Society, Environment and Development, Climate Change, Ecosystem Health, Human Wildlife Conflicts, Land Use Change and Natural Ecosystems, Mineral Prospecting and Mining, Hydrology, Geomorphology, Rural and Urban Planning, Resource Mapping and Planning, Remote Sensing and Geographical Information Systems, Climatology, Population Geography, Medical Geography, Biogeography, Integrated Climatology, Population Geography, and Biogeography. Several new programmes are proposed in order to meet the needs and challenges of the society and job market. These programmes include certificate, diploma, B.Sc., M.Sc. and Ph.D. levels.

Transforming Lives through Quality Education

FERD Hosts IWRM Scholars

In the course of the last half year, the Faculty of Environment and Resources Development (FERD) has introduced a number of programmes through which the University is imparting critical skills in environment and natural resources development in its students. In addition, staff from the Faculty have been showcasing the University's reputation through participation in various academic events in international forums.

To begin with, FERD has put in place three vibrant short courses. One is in Environmental and Social Impact Assessment and Audit. Through it, the Faculty has trained staff from various institutions in the country, including the Kenya Rural Roads Authority and the Kenya Energy Generating Company. The second course is in Geographical Information Systems. It is provided as a tool for environmental management and development planning. And the third is in Ecotourism and Hospitality Management. It is a one-year certificate course that is tailored for those intending to enrol into the Diploma programme. It is hosted by the Department of Natural Resources.

Currently, the Faculty is scouting for partnerships with industry and stakeholders through which sustainable solutions to the waste management problems facing the country can be found. The Faculty has the capacity to provide training to all levels of government, especially county governments, since the waste management portfolio is a devolved function.

Secondly, in the course of the year, a number of scholars from the Faculty participated in international academic conferences, through which they presented papers on various critical a s p e c t s of e n v i r o n m e n t a l development. For example, on 17-19 October 2018, Prof. G.O. Obwoyere, Dr. P. Omenge, Dr. G.W. Eshiamwata, and Dr. S.M. Makindi presented a paper entitled "Renewable Energy Resource Development and Procedural Application of Environmental and Social Impact Assessment Tool: Lessons from Kenya" at the International Conference on Solar Technologies and Hybrid Mini Grids to Improve Energy Access", which was held at the University of the Balearic Islands, Palma (Mallorca, Spain).

Furthermore, on 18-19 October 2018, the Department of Geography hosted 30 participants from the Australia Awards Africa Irrigation and Water Resources Management (IWRM) for a short course in Agriculture. The participants came from 11 African countries and were accompanied by Dr. Gunnar Kirchhof from the University of Queensland Australia, Dr. Tolessa Debele from the Ethiopian Institute of Agricultural Research (EIAR), and Prof. Joshua Ogunwole, the Vice-Chancellor of Bowen University, Nigeria. The event was organised by the International

Development team from the University of Queensland, Australia.

While at Egerton, the group was welcomed by the Dean FERD, Prof. Gilbert Obwoyere, and in the course of their stay at the University they attended lectures on "Irrigation Technologies in Kenya" and "Conversation Agriculture Practices in Kenya," which were presented by Dr. C.W. Recha of the Department of Geography and Mr. Zachary Mainuri of Crops, Horticulture and Soils respectively. Subsequent to the lecture sessions, they visited the Madrugada Farm at Kabarak, from where they experienced large-scale conversion agriculture.

The Australia Awards are funded by the Australian Government and managed by the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. The purpose of the Australia Awards Short Courses is to develop the capacity and leadership skills of professionals so that they can contribute more effectively to development in their home countries.

s we gather to celebrate your tremendous achievements on this auspicious occasion, I take this opportunity to congratulate every one of you on your great accomplishment!

We are indeed very proud of all that you have done during your time at the Faculty of Health Sciences, and we wish you the best as you begin this next phase in your life.

The Faculty of Health Science (FHS) facilitates the acquisition of knowledge and skills in different specialties for effective and efficient management of healthcare, through research publications in refereed journals, increase in student enrolment in the Faculty's programmes, and eventually working towards improving the successful completion of studies.

In the 2018/2019 Academic Year the Faculty got the first batch of government sponsored students in Bachelor of Science in Nursing and Bachelor of Science in Clinical Medicine. This is an achievement because in the past we only had regular students in Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MBChB), as well as Bachelor of Science in Food Nutrition and Dietetics.

FHS has been collaborating with three institutions, namely; the University of Toronto, Canada; the Nakuru Level V Referral Hospital; and Kenyatta National Hospital on a project entitled "Awake Craniotomy." On 20 and 21 September 2018, the third camp was successfully organised and held at the Nakuru Level V Referral Hospital under the guidance of Prof. Mark Bernstein from the University of Toronto. The project involves carrying out simple to complex neurosurgical procedures on patients who are awake or lightly sedated without them losing consciousness. The procedure allows for shorter hospital stay, quick recovery and early ambulation. The collaboration is expected to benefit all patients and at the same time expose FHS students to novel teachings.

This year, the Rotary International funded five members of staff in clinical areas to visit Omaha, Nebraska, USA. The aim of the visit was to collaborate with healthcare professionals at the University of Nebraska Medical Centre, to learn new technology on simulation training in Helping Babies Breathe, and to participate in a training programme for healthcare workers in Continuous Positive Airway Pressure.

The Laerdel Grant funded a three-day simulation-based training in basic and advanced paediatric life support and emergency obstetric care. The target trainees were staff in FHS and County health workers, the main objective being improvement of skills in the health sector in neonatal and maternal outcomes.

The Faculty now boasts of a gender balanced workforce, the result of

administrative staff transfers initiated by the Human Capital Department. For a long time, the Faculty had been dominated by a female workforce. The transformation is a plus to the University because it enables the Faculty to abide by the constitution on the issue of gender representation.

Similarly, in the course of the year, the University Management recruited two academic staff in the Departments of Surgery and Nursing to boost the overstretched academic staff. The Faculty appreciates the efforts made by the management and still looks forward to recruitment of more lecturers.



Let me conclude with a famous quote by a child psychiatrist and author called Robert Coles: "It is a good thing to be smart. But the smartest thing is to know that you must be good."

Upgrading Research at Department of Community Health

s an academic requirement, students at the levels of year three and five for the MBChB and B.Sc. Clinical Medicine programmes respectively undertake a mandatory field attachment. During the field visits, the students carry out research in various areas of their interest. In the past, students traditionally conducted research as individuals and presented their findings in isolation. This approach, though workable, was found to be inexpedient in delivering quality research. Based on this realisation, the Department unanimously agreed to reconsider the traditional approach with the view of re-invigorating research management in the Department.

Part of the efforts towards improving research delivery in the Department was to introduce departmental Sections. Four specialised Sections were therefore born in the Department: the **Epidemiology and Biostatistics Section** (headed by Dr. Ramadhan L. Mawenzi); the Environmental and Occupational Safety and Health Section (headed by Mr. David K. Njeru); the Health Service Management Section (headed by Ms. Catherine W.Wanyange), and the Research & Medical Education Section (headed by Dr. Ronald O. Omenge). The respective Section Heads have been mandated to manage the delivery of taught units in their Sections as well as instruct, coach and supervise students under their jurisdiction to carry out quality research in and beyond the Department of Community Health.

To further bolster its new stimulus, the Department recently introduced the concept of group research. This approach recommends that students at a particular site of field attachment conduct research as a group. The approach was endorsed as a means to increase precision and efficiency in conducting research. The reason is that the different talents inherent in a group increase research proficiency. Different groups of students are assigned a supervisor who, depending on his/her Section, guides the students to conduct studies relevant to his/her area of specialisation. This multidisciplinary and multisectoral approach was preferred because it produces diverse research topics and avoids the monotony of students conducting similar studies.

In order to increase its visibility and that of the Faculty and the entire University, the Department of Community Health has identified an open access journal – *International Journal of Community Medicine and Public Health* – to which all research articles will be submitted for publication.

The first beneficiaries of the group research initiatives have successfully completed their group research activities and presented their findings before the entire Department, the

Faculty of Health Sciences and the Kenya Medical Training College (KMTC) fraternity, an event that took place at KMTC Seminar Hall One on 11 and 12 October 2018. The activity, which was graced by the Dean of the Faculty of Health Sciences, was a total success. All the research findings that were presented reflected a paradigm shift towards contemporariness and pertinence. The fifth-year MBChB students presented their research findings with elegance, ease and confidence, depicting a level of knowledge built from proper grounding.

The Department has formed a Research Quality Committee which will vet all the research conducted to determine those suitable for presentation at the next Egerton University Research Week. Projectsfound to be of superior quality will be submitted to journals for publication. As the Dean of the Faculty of Health Sciences is wont to say, "The research wheel has just begun to roll in the Faculty of Health Sciences, watch this space".

We remain committed to quality teaching, creation and application of knowledge through pure and applied research, and dissemination of new knowledge through scholarly publications in forums that have locally and internationally-recognised research standing.

Apart from equipping our students with knowledge, skills and attitudes that enable them to eventually participate in such ceremonies, our staff have continued to contribute to knowledge-generation through research. For example, Mr. Sammy Kiplagat, from the Department of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology, was recently named one of the two winners of the Business Platform for Nutrition ResearchAflatoxin-Control Challenge through the Partnership for Aflatoxin Control in Africa (PACA) Platform, which met in Dakar, Senegal, in early October 2018.

Similarly, Dr. Alice Njue, a lecturer in the Chemistry Department, returned from a one-mouth research sojourn at Kingston University, United Kingdom, in July. She was hosted by the School of Life Sciences, Pharmacy and Chemistry at the University. She was benefiting from a collaborative exchange programme between the Chemistry Department and Kingston through the initiative of herself and her peer Dr. Sianne Schwikkard, who teaches at the School. The programme involves the exchange of staff members and students whereby the host University provides laboratory space, equipment and analysis of samples at no cost. Dr. Njue's travel to the United Kingdom was funded by the

Royal Society of Chemistry.

Prof. Josphat Matasyoh of the Department of Chemistry, together with partners from several universities in Africa and Europe, won a research grant worth 1.1 million euros. The grant, whose acronym is "Phytochem," incorporates teaching, research, and product-development components.

Prof. Matasyoh's partners are Prof. Michael Spiteller of the Technical University of Germany and Mr. Ulrich Feiter of Parceval Pharmaceuticals Ltd of South Africa. The grant is co-funded by the Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF) of Germany and the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) under the programme "Partnerships for Sustainable Solutions with Sub-Saharan Africa-Bio-economy."

We are presenting to this Graduation the pioneer group of Actuarial Science, but, equally importantly, we have received 410 freshmen and women, who have enrolled into various degree programmes in the Faculty. Furthermore, the number of students pursuing post-graduate degrees in Limnology and Wetland Management (LWM) has gradually risen over the years, due not only to the popularity of the programme but also the immense support we have been receiving from the institutions with which we have been partnering, in terms of infrastructure, marketing and scholarships. The 2017-2019 group attracted 13 students, who are one person more than the previous lot. Interestingly, for the first time ever, the number of women, at eight, is higher than that of men, at five, in the 2017-2019 LWM group.

This International Masters programme has so far attracted students from 20 countries, namely Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, Rwanda, Ethiopia, South-

Sudan, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Nigeria, Benin, Colombia, Nicaragua, Guatemala, Bangladesh, Pakistan, Nepal, Austria, Switzerland, Germany and Romania.

The sixth intake of the 2018-2020 group has a total of 12 students from five nationalities. Their admission was done jointly by the three partner institutions in accordance with the Cooperation Agreement. Their first trimester began at BOKU University, Austria, in October 2018. The rich multicultural blend in the programme exposes the participants to rare and unique life experiences and team work dynamics. The African students benefit from the opportunity to explore developed worlds as they build capacity to solve their home-country environmental management challenges. Similarly, their European counterparts visit and tour Africa, promoting tourism as they study our interesting and geographically unique aquatic and terrestrial systems.

The 18-month course is a mind opener and life time experience for the students. Not only does it impart in them the critical-thinking capabilities they require but it also prepares them adequately for the responsibility of managing complex issues in the workplace. The programme has contributed considerably to the development of expertise in environment, education, governannce, mon-governmental organisations, and consultancy.

On 27 June 2018, at Boku University, Vienna, Austria, the LWM Cooperation Agreement was ratified by the Vice-Chancellors/Rectors of the partner institutions. The colourful event was attended by the Vice-Chancellor of Egerton, Prof. Rose A. Mwonya; the then Acting Registrar, Academic Affairs, Prof. Samuel Wachanga; the Coordinator and Director of the Board of Post-Graduate Studies, Prof. Nzula Kitaka; and other Rectors and Coordinators from BOKU Univeristy, Austria, and IHE-Delft, The Netherlands. Apart from renewing the Cooperation Agreement, the meeting recruited other players in the region, who are currently involved in finalising the Agreement between the institutions concerned.

raduation is here once again, and we celebrate the achievement of the graduating class of students in the Faculty of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery on this 39th Graduation Ceremony. The in-depth academic and co-curricular experiences you have gone through in the Faculty have equipped you with the required technical know-how and confidence to go out and serve as capable stewards in the animal health profession. You are now career-ready and in possession of the requisite Day-1, Animal Health graduate competencies and skills.

The Faculty has been continuously expanding its undergraduate student enrolment base. In the 2018/2019 academic year, we admitted 30 Bachelor of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery (BVM) and 20 diploma students. The Staff/Student ratios are projected to get better with the ongoing staff recruitment drive. In the course of the year, many staff members were either recruited into the Faculty or promoted. Furthermore, three members in the Faculty attracted research funding in various categories. Prof. Njenga Munene, Prof. Inyagwa Muleke, and Prof. Abdul Faraj won Ksh.41 million from National Research Fund's (NRF) C o m p e titive Institution al Infrastructure Support Project, which will be used to equip Egerton's Safe Foods Reference Laboratory (SAF-LAB) from 2018 to 2022. In addition, Prof. Inyagwa Muleke won Ksh.12 million from the Competitive Multidisciplinary NRF Projects for the Food Safety Project.

Members in the Faculty made important contributions to scholarly work in their respective areas. For example, a number of lecturers published papers in international journals such as the *International Journal of Innovative Research & Development* and the *Egerton Journal of Science and Technology.* In addition, three of lecturers, R.S. Shivairo, C. I. Muleke, and D. Lubembe, published a text book entitled *Veterinary Parasitology and Parasitic Diseases.*

It is also important to note that in the course of the year, the Dean of the Faculty, Prof. Muleke, participated in a number of activities that have contributed significantly to the development of the Faculty. On 3-7 July 2018, he attended the Vet Ed 2018, International Symposium of the Veterinary Schools Council at Utrecht University in The Netherlands. In the course of the symposium, a sound working collaboration with the Faculty of Veterinary Medicine, Utrecht University, was established. At the same time a paper on the current situation of veterinary education in Africa was presented at this symposium.

Secondly, on 22-27 July 2018, the Dean attended the launching of the Africa Association for Veterinary Education Establishments (2A2E), which was organised by the African Union - Inter African Bureau for Animal Resources (AU-IBAR). During the event, the Faculty of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery was recognised by the Africa Association for Veterinary Education Establishments. In addition, a continental network of Veterinary Education Establishments (VEES) in Africa was established. Furthermore, in May 2018, two Memoranda of Understanding were signed between the Faculty and Masaai Mara University as well as Baraton University whose objective is to foster closer collaboration in animal health training among the three institutions.

Finally, from 1 to 28 September 2018, the Dean travelled to Nanjing Agricultural University (NAU), China, with the support of NAU and the Confucius Institute at Egerton. In the course of the visit, collaborative research/training linkages were established with academic staff in the College of Veterinary Medicine, NAU.

Once again, I wish to congratulate all the animal health graduands for their hard work and accomplishments. I sincerely wish you well in the next phase of you lives. May God bless you all in your future endeavours.

oday marks an important occasion in the University calendar. We are here to celebrate the achievements of the graduands of the 39th Graduation Ceremony. Graduation is an important activity because it sums up the efforts made by each candidate in his or her studies. By the same token, it underscores the contribution of the academic staff and departments in the success of the graduands. For this reason, the Directorate of Undergraduate Studies and Field Attachment Programmes (BUGS/FAP) is proud to be associated with the graduands, especially those who are graduating from the undergraduate programmes. We congratulate them all.

The BUGS/FAP is mandated with the review of, and recommendation to the Senate on, the quality of undergraduate degree and diploma curricula. The Board also coordinates and facilitates field/industrial attachment (FA) and teaching practice (TP). BUGS interacts with undergraduate students long before they set foot in class, the period in which they select their programmes of study. The Directorate also interacts with them extensively during their field attachment.

In September 2018, over 1300 students were attached to various organisations, institutions, NGOS, and industries for the mandatory industrial attachment programme. Over 150 students specialising in agricultural sciences were attached in various farms across eight counties. Students attached on farms carry out farm appraisals and, together with the farmers, make farm plans for improving and/or addressing the issues raised during farm assessment. To support the farm attachment programme, an online platform "Farm Connect (farmup.egerton.ac.ke), has been established. The platform is useful to farmers, students, and other stakeholders in the agriculture sector. It is hosted on the University website under the Division of Research and Extension and currently has content on production and marketing issues for maize, potato, dairy, poultry, and a number of other selected cross-cutting issues.

Finally, Egerton University has partnered with Arava International Agricultural Training Centre (AICAT) in Israel to provide hands-on skills for students undertaking agricultural related sciences. The 11-month programme provides selected students with an opportunity to be attached to farms and farmer organisations in the Arava region of Israel. The students work for five days in the farms and attend lectures once a week. The 2018-2019 cohort (which is the 5th cohort) started in July 2018 and comprises of 117 students drawn mainly from Egerton University, Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology, the National Irrigation Board, the University of Nairobi, and the Kenya Water Institute. They include 33 Egerton University students.

oday is a special day when our graduands come back to our campus to receive their diplomas and degrees, join their parents, relatives, friends and former lecturers in celebrating their academic achievements, pose for photos and more importantly plan for their next steps in pursuing their dreams.

Though graduation has many dimensions, including being considered a rite of passage, it reflects continuity in one's personal development and it is seen as a confirmation that graduands have demonstrated the quality of trainability, learning, re-learning and endurance. At independence in 1963, graduates did not struggle much to enter the labour market. At that time, the government came up with such policies as Africanisation of employment opportunities in both public and private sectors. We also have a Student Mothers' programme where our female students who get babies while at the University can leave them under a care giver as they carry on with their studies. Sporting Activities

During the year, Egerton registered commendable results in the National Rugby Circuit that constitutes six circuits. With the support of the DVC (AA) and the Egerton Rugby Team, known as the Egerton Wasps, featured in five out of the six circuits. During the final circuit, Egerton finished second behind Masinde Muliro University. Despite the defeat Egerton scooped the overall Division II with a massive 82 points. Egerton Wasps were awarded two trophies as runners up and overall national champions. With the good performance against financial constraints, New Point Hospital in Njoro and Menengai Cream Company stepped in to support the team. They donated two new sets of playing kits to be used during home and away games.

As a result of this good performance, Egerton Wasps were called up to participate in the Inaugural Varsity 15s League that listed top eight national universities to participate. Egerton was listed in group B alongside Kenyatta University (KU), Technical University of Mombasa (TUM) and Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT). Egerton emerged second from the group stages behind KU thereby qualifying for the semi-finals. Egerton hosted the semifinals where they played University of Nairobi's Mean Machine in a tough tensed match that ended in a draw after normal and sudden death extra time. The match was decided on five penalty kicks that saw UoN win to book a final spot with KU, leaving Egerton to fight for third place with Catholic University. All the participating teams were given new playing kits courtesy of Sports Options, Fidelity Insurance, Home Boys, Samurai Sportswear and Kenya Universities Sports Association

(KUSA). This leaves Egerton with three new kits, giving a big morale to the team currently playing in the National Rugby Championship League.

Egerton also hosted KUSA-Rift ball games that featured football and basketball games for KUSA-Rift conference teams. The men's football team finished first while ladies finished second whereas basketball teams finished third in all categories.

With good known grounds, Egerton was selected to host the Third International Wood Ball Tournament from 28-30 September 2018. This championship attracted teams from Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania that featured senior men and women and corporate teams. Egerton finished ninth out of 17 and sixth out 12 in senior men and women categories respectively. The corporate side finished fourth out of nine. It was the first time Egerton was participating in this tournament and the results are a clear indicator of future performance.

It is worth acknowledging the great effort of well wishers and groups that have since helped the teams. For example, the Egerton Wasps hosted the Egerton Old Boys Team on 3 November 2018 for an annual meet otherwise called Wazee-Vijana Tournament which saw both sides not only play but plant trees and launch a rugby ladies team called Egerton Hornets.

The soccer old boys have equally stepped in and donated a new uniform and balls to the Egerton Football Team. These were handed over on 20 October 2018 after the annual Old Boys Tournament. We also recognise former Egerton lecturer Prof. Rotich aka Malawi who has also supported the team in kind during their preparations.

UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

Mong other activities, the University Library contributed to students' academic development in the course of the year by organising workshops and training sessions in the course of which they acquired a great deal of knowledge in information science. Among them were the activities discussed below.

Emerald Knowledge Ambassador Workshop

Students from Egerton University participated in the 6th Emerald Knowledge Ambassador Workshop held at Daystar University on 28 September 2018. It was attended by 19 Universities. The University sent 10 students and two staff members. The objective of the workshop was to create awareness of electronic resources. The students prepared a fifteen-minute video clip which they played at the workshop. The clip was on developing community libraries as part of charity work. This participation enabled Egerton students to interact with librarians and other Emerald Student Knowledge Ambassadors from various universities in Kenya who presented on the benefits of electronic resources and built potentially lifelong networks.

Library Trains Students on E-Resources

As a way of equipping different users, the Library has continuously engaged students by organising training aimed at equipping them with skills to use electronic resources. In September 2018, the Library trained 1,384 first year students on library skills and information resources. In support of the University's academic programmes, the Library has embraced technology by providing 24/7 access to information resources of up to 291,066 electronic books and 85,290 electronic journals. The Library also has a collection of 145,479 print books. The first-year students were trained on how to access and use these resources.

The Library has also continued to contribute to knowledge management in the University by preserving and providing access to content generated within the University by uploading such content to the Institutional Repository. A number of post-graduate students have recently been trained on how to use the Institutional Repository to access completed theses and projects as they conduct their research.

The University also participated in the 6th African Higher Education Week and RUFORUM Biennial Conference 2018 which took place at Kenyatta International Conference Centre (KICC) from 22 to 26 October 2018. The theme of the conference was "Aligning African Universities to Accelerate Attainment of Africa's Agenda 2063". The University exhibited the following innovations under several sections:

Faculty of Engineering & Technology: Improved Sorghum thresher, Chaff cutter, and Animal feeds mixer. Agro Science Park: Certified seed varieties including beans, sorghum, groundnuts, finger millet, Mbaazi, pigeon pea and chick pea.

Department of Dairy, Food Science & Technology: Extruded fish feeds containing cricket meal and extruded fish feeds containing black soldier fly larvae meal & beef extension using Gum Arabic from *Acacia Senegal var*: *kerensis*.

University Projects: Centre of

Excellence in Sustainable Agriculture and Agribusiness Management (CESAAM): Scholarship opportunities, CESAAM sponsored programmes, creating awareness, advertising of short courses.

Transforming African Agricultural Universities to meaningfully contribute to Africa's growth and development TAGDev (2016-2024): Provision of entrepreneurial support to students, support of action research, support university community engagement and experiential learning, and students support services.

Centre of Excellence for Livestock Innovation and Business (CoELIB): Incubation and business development.

Streamlining Research, Extension, and Consultancy

The Division of Research and Extension is mandated to coordinate research, extension, and consultancy services towards delivery on Strategic Goals 2, 4 & 5 of the 2013-2018 Egerton University Strategic Plan. Strategic Goal two (SG2) is to increase research, consultancy, and community outreach; Strategic Goal four (SG4) is to increase linkages and collaborations; and Strategic Goal five (SG5) is to enhance governance & resource mobilisation.

Policies

The delivery on the strategic goals is guided by specific University Policies. The policies currently in place are: The Research Policy; The Intellectual Property Rights Policy (IPRP); The Consultancy Policy; and The Extension and Outreach Policy. These policies are reviewed periodically to better serve the stakeholders in the changing environment. The review for the next three years was finalised in a two-day workshop between 11 and 12 October 2018 at the Kenya Wildlife Service Training Institute in Naivasha. In addition, the Sub-Committee reviewed the University Publications Policy which has been under development.

Research and Innovation

Egerton University has in the last four years implemented 110 research projects worth over Ksh 2.7 billion raised through direct grant proposals in

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food security nexus. The projects are subjected to planned monitoring and evaluation to ensure anticipated outputs are delivered and resources are utilised prudently for intended purposes. For this, the Division has developed a Research Information Management System (RIMS) to enhance management of the research projects and their outputs. A training workshop on the use of RIMS for researchers was held on 31 July 2018 at the CMRT seminar room. The system can be accessed through rims.egerton.ac.ke and all researchers are expected to upload their projects into RIMS by 15 December 2018.

Research Dissemination

The Division jointly with the Loughborough University of United Kingdom hosted the 41st WEDC International Conference between 9 and 13 July 2018, under the theme "Transformation towards Sustainable and Resilient WASH Services". WEDC is a water, engineering and development centre for developing knowledge and capacity in water and sanitation. The conference attracted 537 delegates, 168 papers and 29 exhibitors and 450 post-graduate students were exposed to career opportunities in the water, sanitation and hygiene sectors.

Community Outreach and Extension

Two activities targeted to community outreach and extension in priority areas were undertaken. These are the outreach support to community irrigation scheme (Kokwet Ndarugu Irrigation project) in Nakuru County, and sweet potatoes production and nutrition in Maralala, Samburu County. In both cases, priority interventions were identified and agreed upon in a participatory process involving the target community beneficiaries before commencement of the implementation process.

Resource Mobilisation

S i x n e w projects worth Ksh74,308,868.00 won by the University Researchers. Both staff and post-graduate students competed for the National Research Fund (NRF) 2018 call for proposals. Of the 122 proposals submitted, 61 had Principal Investigators from Egerton University.

Contributions to Government Prioritised Big Four Agenda

In support of the Big Four National Growth and Development Agenda, Egerton University is running 115 research projects under different thematic areas including food security (55), universal health (12), environment and natural resources (20), economy and socio-political dynamics (6), engineering and ICT (5) and education (17).

DRTEC Spearheads Biodiversity Conservation

The Dryland Research Training and Ecotourism Centre (DRTEC) has partnered with the Kenya Organic Agriculture Network (KOAN) in implementing a two-year Small Grants Programme/Global Environment Facility (SGP/GEF) Biodiversity Conservation project on the Lake Bogoria Landscape (LBL). The Ten Million SGP/GEF grant proposal was developed by Mr. Eustace Kiarii (Executive Director, KOA) and Prof. George Ogendi (Director, DRTEC) and will be implemented between September 2018 and September 2020.

Lake Bogoria Landscape is an important wildlife conservation area in Kenya holding regionally and nationally endangered species. The Lake Bogoria National Reserve, which falls within the Lake Bogoria Landscape, was designated as a

National Reserve in 1974, and in 2001 it was listed as a Wetland of International Importance under the Ramsar Convention. The Lake Bogoria Landscape is at the risk of degradation arising from unsustainable resource exploitation and ecologically negative catchmentwide processes due to poverty, poor land use, overstocking and unsustainable farming systems. It is against this background that SGP/GEF has agreed to fund conservation initiatives geared towards LBL biodiversity conservation that will in turn positively impact on the socioeconomic wellbeing of the area residents.

Between 24 and 27 September 2018, Prof. Ogendi and Mr. Kiarii facilitated a capacity building workshop that brought together stakeholders from the Baringo County government and national government agencies (e.g. KEFRI, KALRO, KVDA, KFS) as well as civil society organisations (CSOs) and community based organisations (CBO). A key product from this workshop was an adaptive Management Plan for the LBL that was informed by a baseline survey conducted earlier. Four main thematic areas were identified as the focus for the conservation efforts: Agriculture and food security, water resources conservation and use, adoption and use of alternative forms of energy, and strengthening of the community wildlife conservation activities. Currently, DRTEC and KOAN are guiding various CBOs and CSOs in developing proposals in response to an SGP/GEF call for biodiversity conservation proposals within the LBL.

The specific activities envisioned include upgrading campus road network in Njoro, construction of runoff drains to the wetlands, rehabilitation of water dams, desludging ponds, replacing asbestos on roofs, expanding car parks, completing catering facilities at Kenyatta Campus, establishing a model solid waste management system, and installation of disability friendly facilities in all buildings.

In order to mobilise resources and coordinate development activities within the University in the short and medium terms, a comprehensive Strategic Plan (2018-2023) has b e e n d e v e l o p e d

The University is also in the process of enhancing security and safety of staff and students on campus. This will be bolstered by the planned installation of a security communication system, completion of the construction of the security access control point, installation of CCTV cameras in strategic locations and construction of a perimeter wall around water dams.

To comply with the government requirement of integration of ICT in teaching, learning, research, extension and management, the University is in the process of enhancing computing devices, data and telephone networks, boosting automation and data processes to support University operations and improving ICT governance and capacity of staff and students.

In the Strategic Planning period (2018-2023) the University will develop quality human capital by implementing the Human Capital Policy and Manual, conducting skills and competencies analysis, enhancing career management programmes, and applying affirmative action in staff recruitment and development. It will also train and promote to managerial positions, females and members of disadvantaged groups employed in the University.

Other ongoing and envisioned activities include improvement of performance management through the implementation of the annual Performance Contract signed with the Ministry of Education and cascaded to all units of the University. Message from the Director

t is my pleasure to congratulate all graduands on their successful c om pletion of diploma, undergraduate, and post-graduate studies at Egerton University. The Directorate of University Welfare Services (UWS) has strived to ensure all staff and students have a peaceful working and learning environment in all the campuses of the University.

Accommodation Services

There have been several changes since May 2018 resulting from fiscal budgetary cuts by the national government towards supporting higher education in public universities. This has prompted the University Management Board to direct UWS to seek ways of cutting costs in major welfare services offered within the Halls and Catering departments.

One significant measure was the closure of the kitchenettes due to high electricity costs caused by students cooking using electric coils. Another measure has been to recycle old mattresses and buy a few new ones for use by our students. Staff have also been re-allocated to increase the number of custodians and ensure better service delivery. We are aware of concerns by staff and students about these measures and we seek for your patience in light of shortage of resources not only at Egerton but at all public universities and the country at large.

Catering Services

Efforts to improve quality of catering services have also been pursued so as to enable students to access decent meals at subsidised prices. This, however, has become a challenge because of high cost of purchasing foodstuff through the public procurement processes. Recommendations to grow our own food to meet our requirements in Njoro Campus agricultural fields have been made and authority given for government to government supply of food items which will hasten the delivery of food supplies.

Disability Mainstreaming

Booking of rooms for students with disabilities is now done at the Disability Mainstreaming Resource Centre. Enrolment of visually impaired students was recorded for the very first time in the Faculty of Law and the Faculty of Education (Ph.D. student).

Five members of staff from ICT, Library and Admission and two from Disability Mainstreaming Unit (DMU) have successfully completed sign language training to improve service delivery to students with disabilities. Staff from DMU and students attended a hike at Mt. Longonot organised by the Kenya Society for the Blind, an annual event seeking to create awareness on the use of white canes for the visually impaired. DMU has also purchased three digital computers, a scanner and CCTV for use by low vision students.

In our efforts to improve University welfare services for all our stakeholders, namely students, staff, clients and visitors, UWS is consulting and seeking input on how best to effectively streamline Employees Assistance which currently relies on referrals.
